This page is dedicated with deepest reverence to the memory of Gaston Maki, who died on Home Coming Day, November 2, 1935.

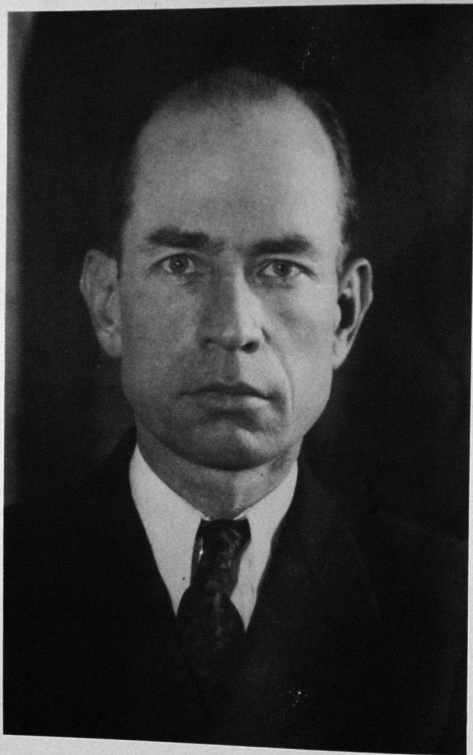
It was Home Coming;

And he, at last, . . . went home.

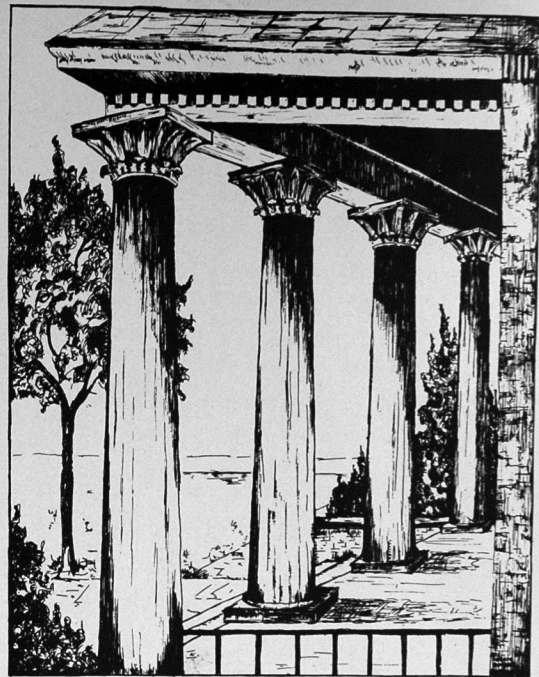

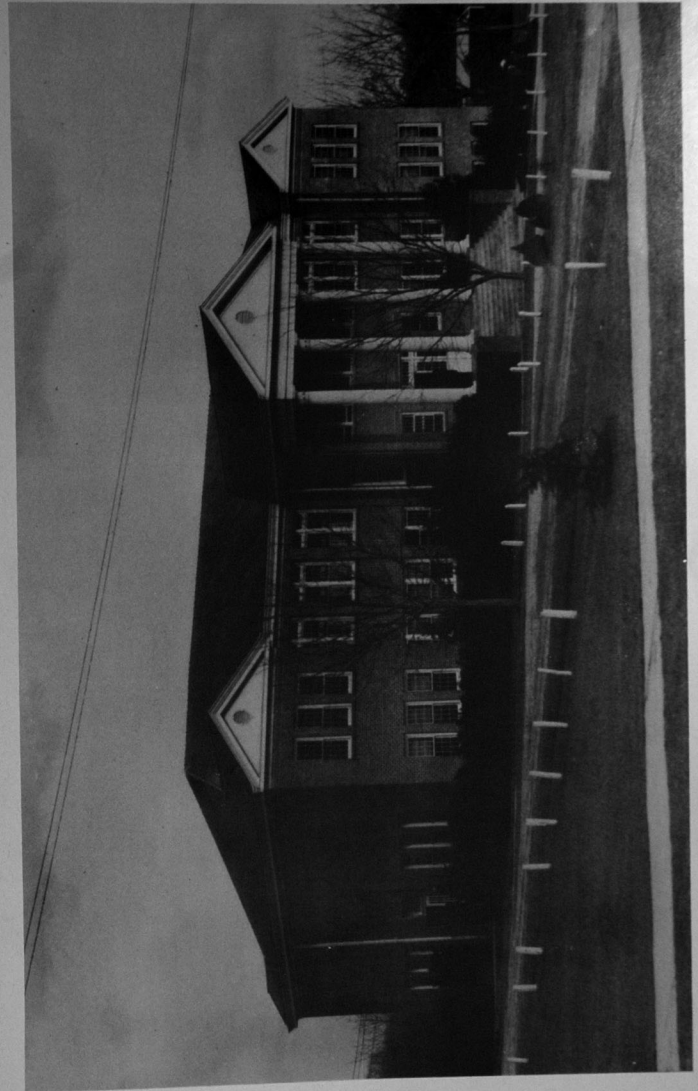

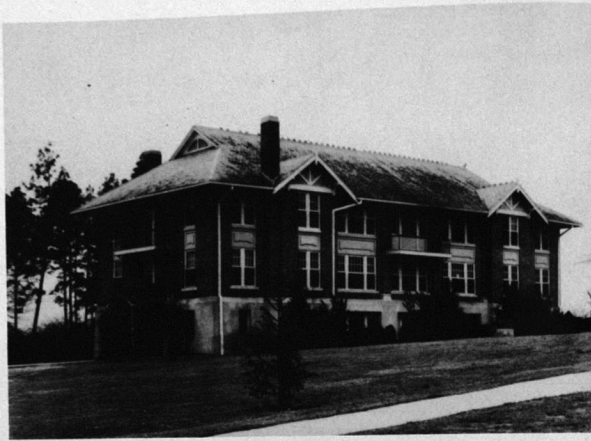


GIRLS' DORMITORY, 4

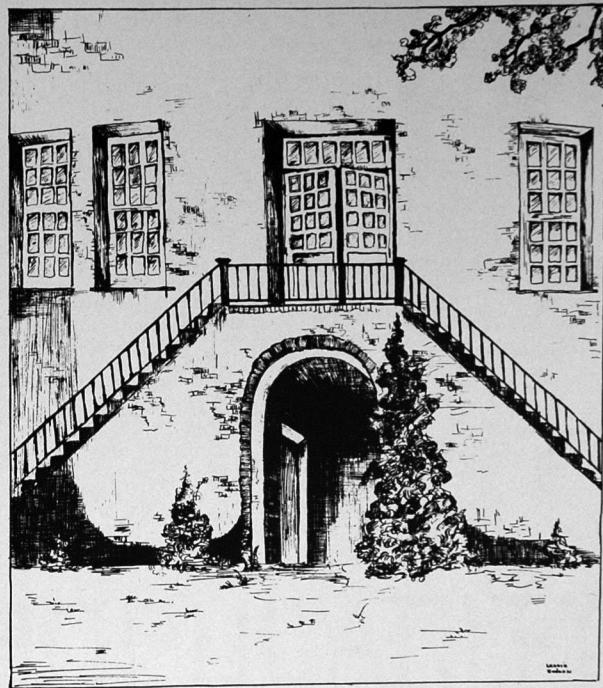

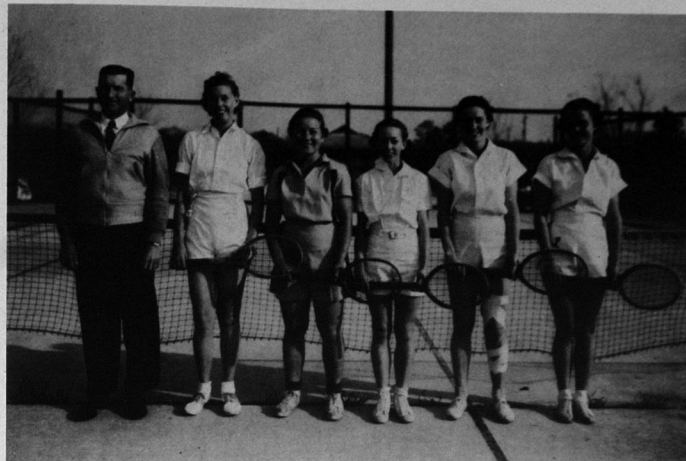

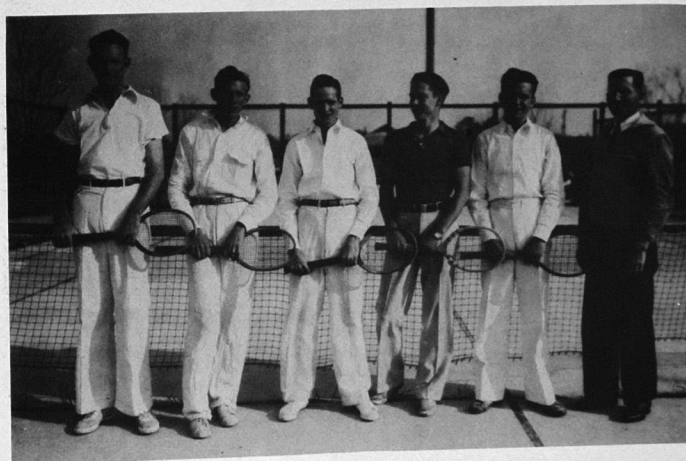

GIRLS' TENNIS TEAM

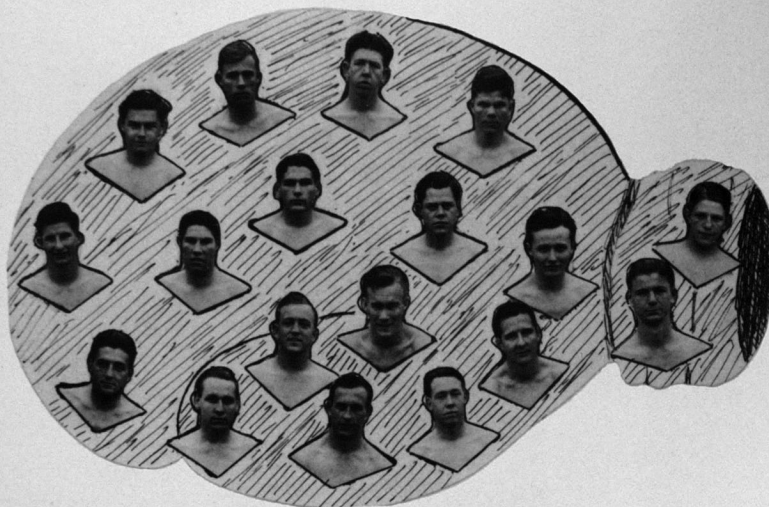
