
Perk 33, Mississippi College Frosh 18


GIRLS' BASKETBALL

IIM LAND-Puts the shot at 48 feet constantly, ranked very high in state meet last year. Is seeing his last year of service.


CLAUDE CAMPBELL-Discus man de luxe; averages 126 feet. Much is expected of him in his last year.

Tom Rush: A lively shortstop who maintained a good fielding average during his first year. He will see much service at his position this year.




