Oh, Perkinston, we all love you!

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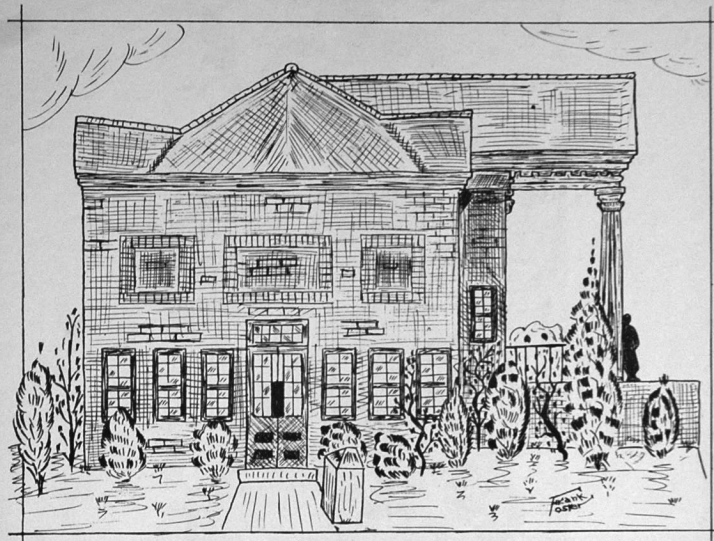

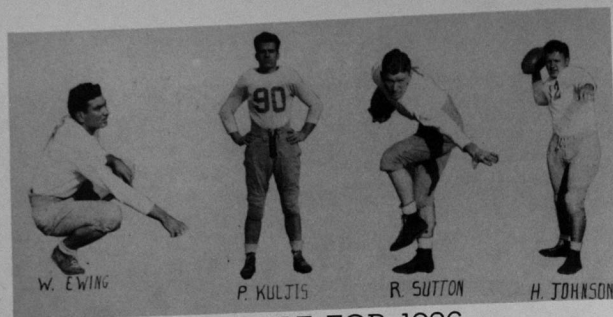
JUNIOR COLLEGE CHAMPIONS 1936

Perk 13, Summit 12

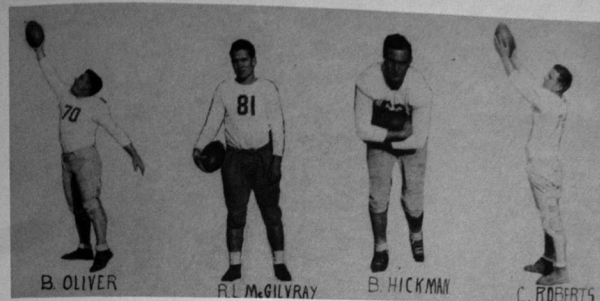

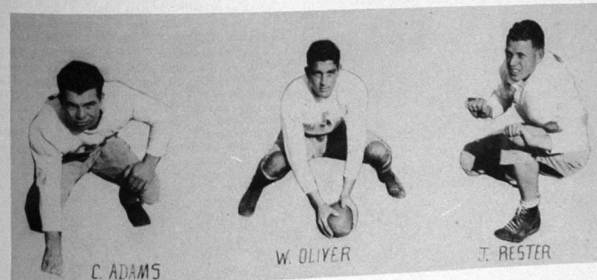
Perk 33, Mississippi College Frosh 18

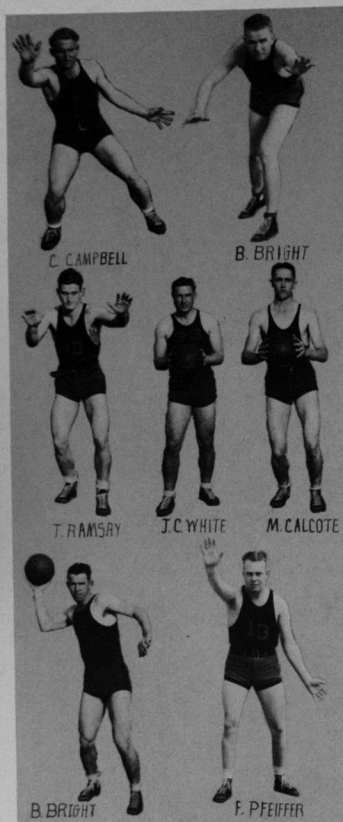

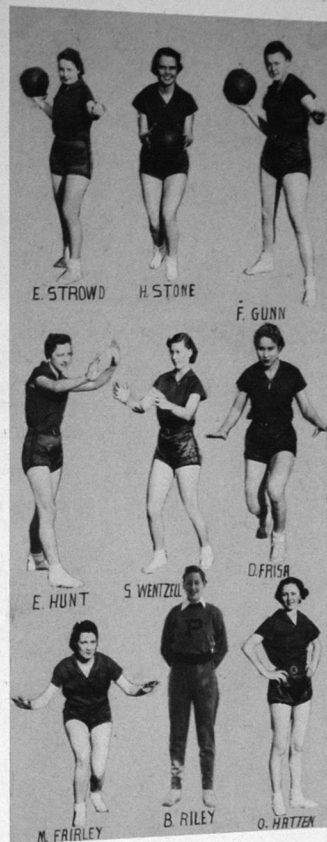


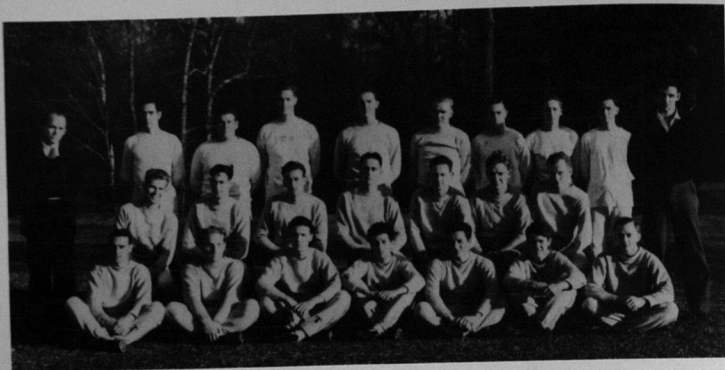
GIRLS' BASKETBALL

JIM LAND—Puts the shot at 48 feet constantly, ranked very high in state meet last year. Is seeing his last year of service.

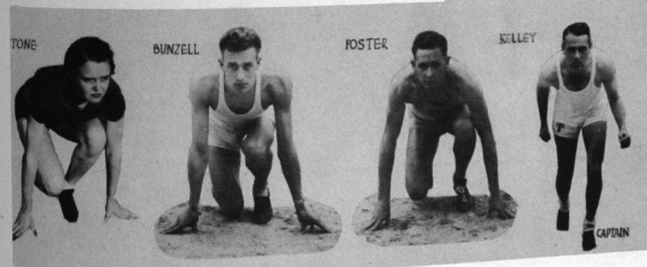
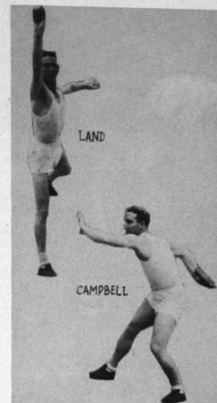
CLAUDE CAMPBELL—Discus man de luxe; averages 126 feet. Much is expected of him in his last year.

Webster Strickland: An up-and-coming pitcher who came through in fine form last spring; has two more years with the Bulldogs.

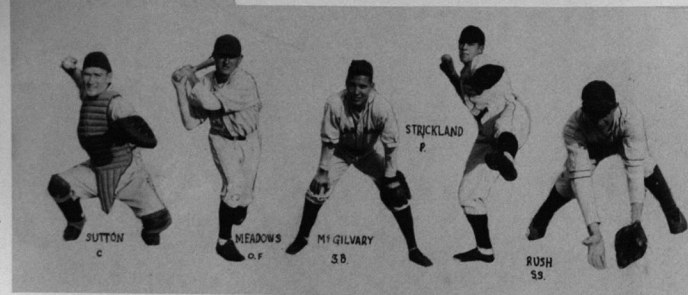
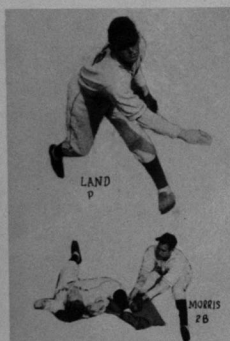
Tom Rush: A lively shortstop who maintained a good fielding average during his first year. He will see much service at his position this year.

Roy Grooms, fighting in the 175 pound division, was a willing scrapper, and with his little experience, stood "toe to toe" with his more seasoned opponents.

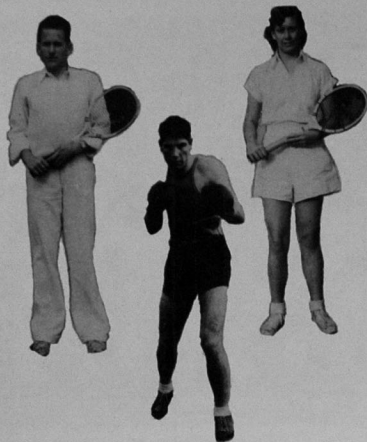

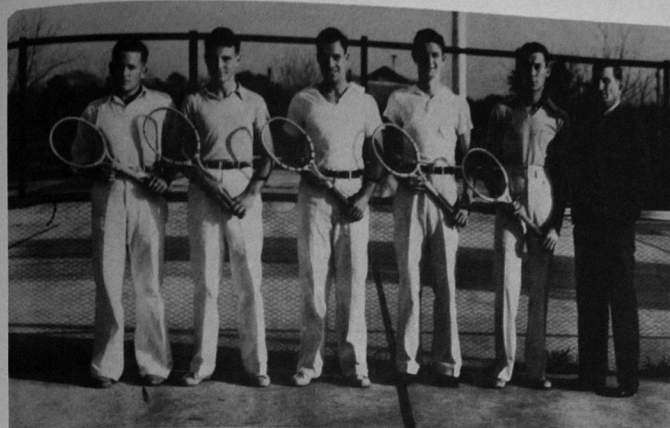

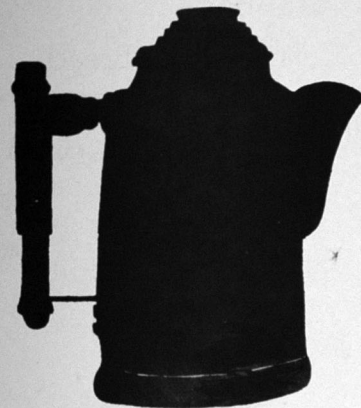
