



FOREWORD

It is often alleged that those who live in an area noted for its scenic beauty or historical significance fail to appreciate the splendour of their natural habitat. This shall not have been true of the students who have produced this book. We have chosen to accent the beautiful and grandiose Mississippi Gulf Coast, an area which presently supplies nearly seventy per cent of the student body of this institution.

It is our dual purpose in this annual to present a brief sketch of the historical eminence and rugged beauty of a Gulf Coast challenged by change and prodded by growth, and to relate the story of a year's events at a school which, for more than half a century, has also challenged the Coast through at least two generations of its youth.

While it has been organized as the Gulf Coast Junior College District for only two years, the facility which is Perkinston has, since its beginning, been a vital heartheat in the survival and success of the southern tip of Mississippi. The spirit and vibrancy that are Perk have been felt and shared by countless South Mississippians who have passed through its doors.

Within two more years, District-affiliated colleges will be operative in Harrison and Jackson Counties. They will be steered by those who have nurtured Perkinston to its present height. The students supplying these colleges will be the same as those who have brought fame to Perk in years past.

The potential of the Gulf Coast Junior College District is unlimited; the service it can render is immense. Its ultimate success will lie in the hands of those to whom Perk has dedicated fifty-two years of service--the citizens of the Gulf Coast.

One of the sister colleges will be almost within sight of a "singing" river made famous exactly two centuries ago by a band of Indians who found peace in its serenely swirling waters. The other will be situated in the general area which lacked one legislative vote in 1841 of becoming the home of the University of Mississippi.

Both campuses are congenially located to provide access to the mainstream of coastal activity. Yet, each retains the secluded quiet which is conducive to pursuit of thought--the atmosphere of inquisitive learning which has prevailed at Perk since its founding.

It is, then, with our thoughts focused on a future in which Perkinston and the Gulf Coast play interdependent roles, that we salute that Coast and all its tradition and its beauty and grandeur.






A Year At Perk


A year at Perk is a bit of life itself. It perhaps resembles, but far contrasts Any other year any-other-where; In variety it is by none surpassed.

We spent our first afternoon in the pool, The evening in the grill, That night in our dorm making friends, Or out under the stars feeding a girl The familiar old spiel.








We shouted a cheer

We have lived life and laughed in the middle.





Sophomores Harvey Bond and Kay Gunn were elected to represent the student body as Mr. and Miss Perk College.



DENNIS MALPASS CHEMISTRY and ATHLETICS



OLD SPANISH FORT AT PASCAGOULA

This, the oldest building in the Mississippi Valley, was built in 1718 by a commissioned French Naval Officer who had received a land concession from the governor of the province of Louisiana. Constructed of virgin pine timbers, oyster shells, mud, and moss, with outer walls measuring eighteen inches in thickness, this fortified outpost provided the French protection from the Indians until it was taken by the Spanish from whom it derived its name.

Eight soverign flags have flown over the Spanish Fort, now operated as a Museum by the Jackson County Historical Society. It has been filled with choice artifacts reflecting several centuries of life along the coast.
