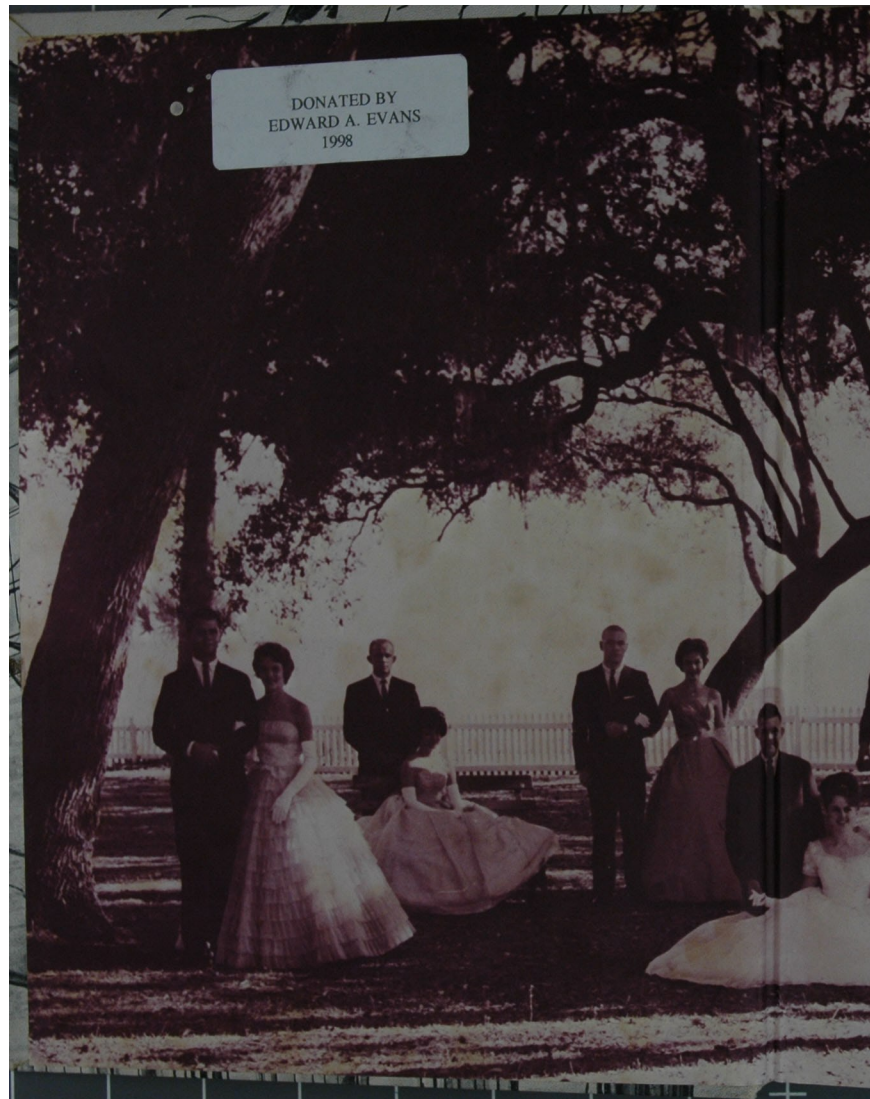

Model of proposed Harrison County College.



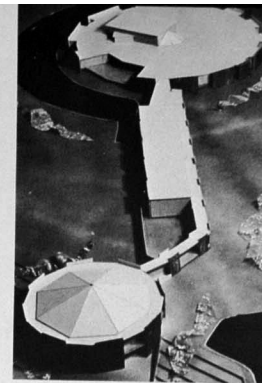

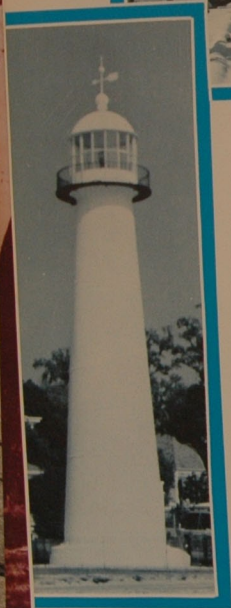

His influence upon Perkinston in four short years has been as a disciple of reality. He has taught us the meaning of reason, the value of thought, the depth and sacredness of freedom.

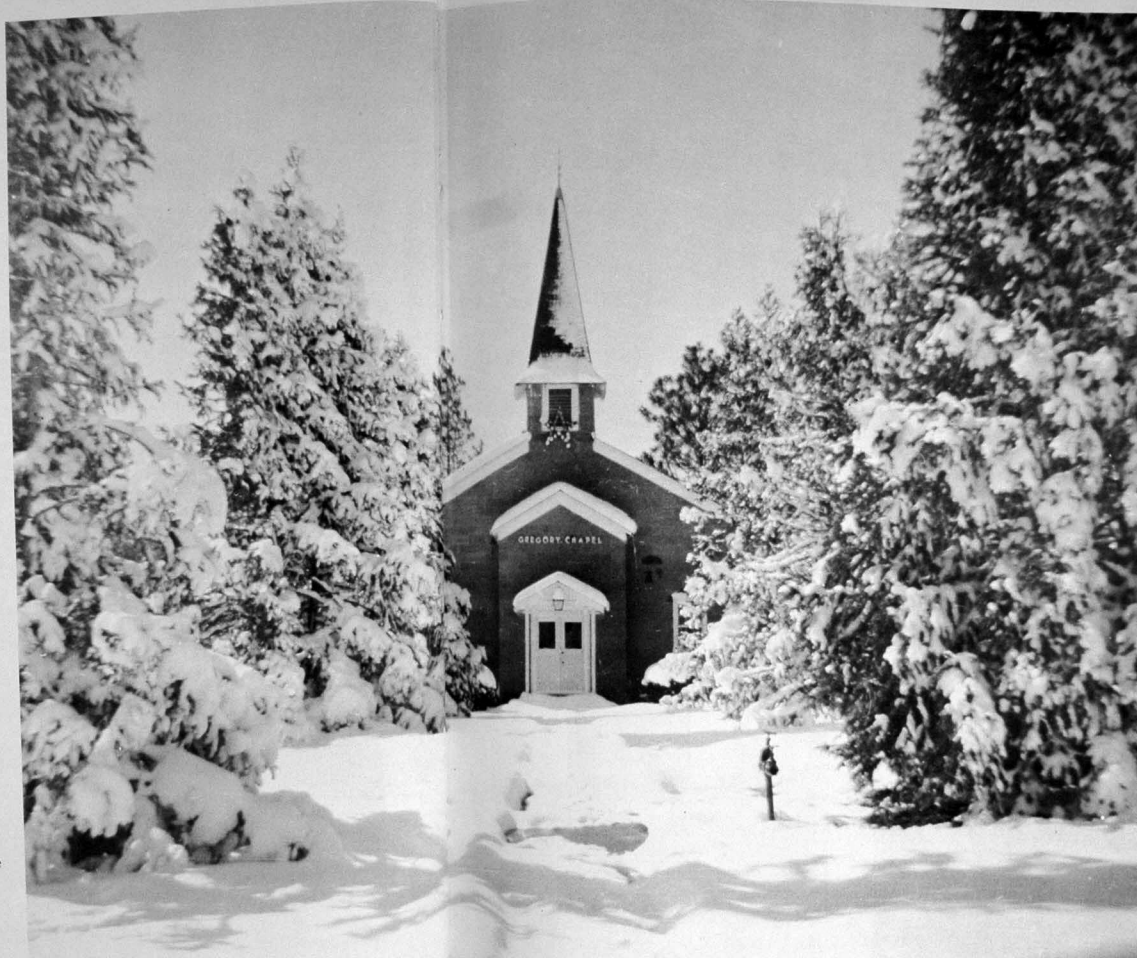

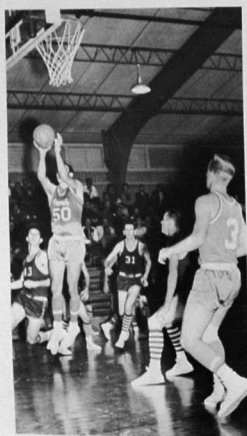




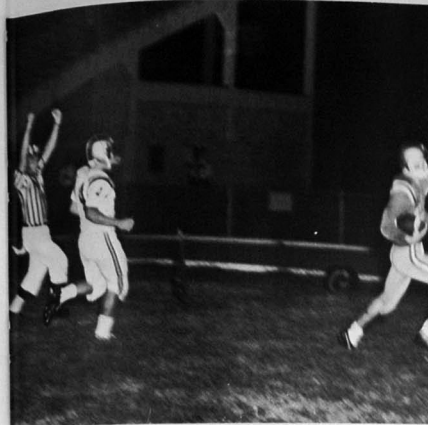
A Year At Perk

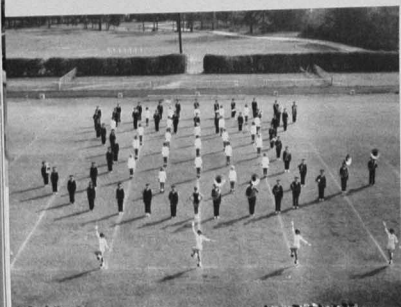
The class we wanted was closed;

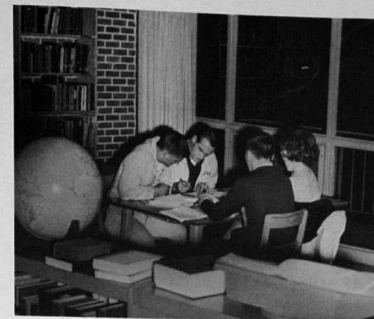
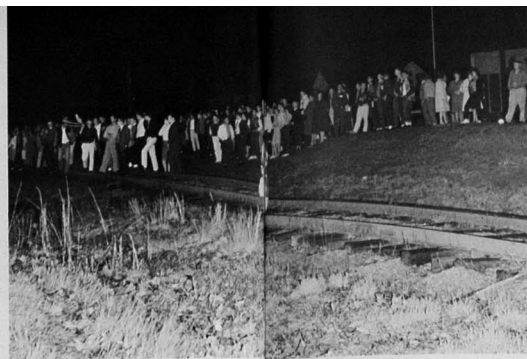


We tortured the freshmen,

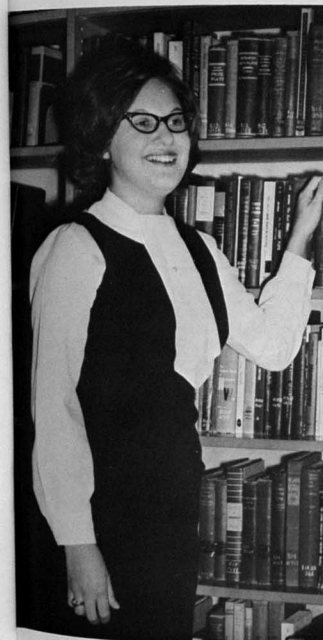
Perkolator Hall of Fame

EDUCATION

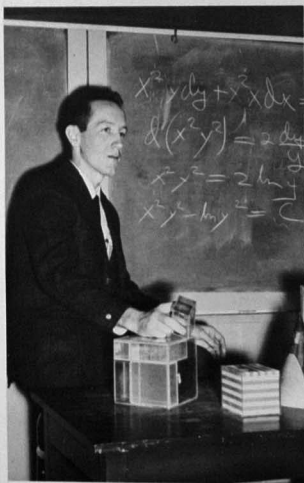

ACCOUNTING

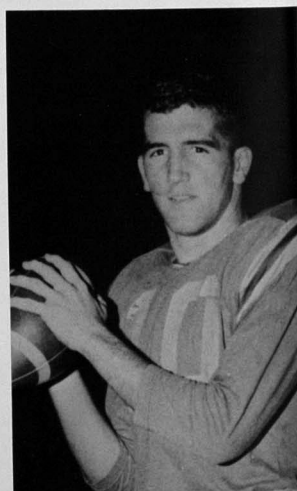

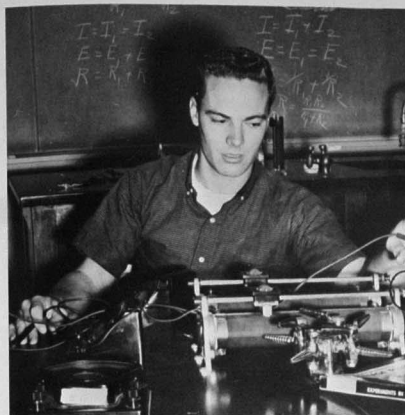
DENNIS MALPASS

OLD SPANISH FORT AT PASCAGOULA

This, the oldest building in the Mississippi Valley, was built in 1718 by a commissioned French Naval Officer who had received a land concession from the governor of the province of Louisiana. Constructed of virgin pine timbers, oyster shells, mud, and moss, with outer walls measuring eighteen inches in thickness, this fortified outpost provided the French protection from the Indians until it was taken by the Spanish from whom it derived its name.

Eight sovereign flags have flown over the Spanish Fort, now operated as a Museum by the Jackson County Historical Society. It has been filled with choice artifacts reflecting several centuries of life along the coast.

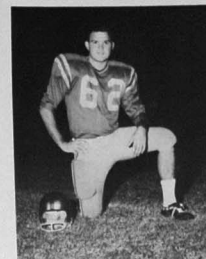
FUMBLES SPELL DEFEAT

BILOXI LIGHTHOUSE

Built in 1848 and still in use, the Biloxi Lighthouse is probably the most photographed landmark on the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

Near the beginning of the Civil War, when Ship Island and its Fort Massachusetts were taken by Union naval forces, a Biloxi citizen climbed the spiral staircase to remove the beacon's lens and bury it. After the War ended, the lens was dug up and restored to its place. Now shining white, the tower was painted black for a short time after Lincoln's assassination to demonstrate Biloxi's mourning.

For those might have a special interest, we present here technical specifications and other odds and ends dealing with the production of this book.

PICTURES. All pictures appearing in the class sections and part of those in the administration section were taken by Fulton Studios, Gulfport. All other pictures, with the exception of the Chapel snow scene (pp. 10-11.) which was contributed by Theo Cowser, were produced by student photographers LaVaughn Congleton, Clifford Moore, Ralph Batchelor, and Forrest McDonald, a student-professional who lent valuable assistance, through the cooperation of Homer Rainwater, Head of the Photography Department. Most pictures were taken with Crown Graphic and Yashica-Mat-LM-Twin Lense Reflex cameras with Strobflash IV by Graflex and Megalume II Electronic Flash. Plus-X Film Packs with cut sheet film, Verichrome Pan, and Tri-X Roll films were developed in DK-60-A (Kodak) and D-76 chemical solutions. Printed with a Government Surplus Contact Printer and OMEGA D-2 Enlarger

on Kodabromide and Medalist papers, and dried or Ferrotyped on stainless steel roller-type dryers. The process color on pp. 4-5 was reproduced from 2 1/2" X 3 1/4" transparencies shot on Ektachrome film. Duotone color was reproduced from black and white prints.

ART. The original artwork on the cover was done in pen and ink by Wanda Rutledge. The halftone sketches in the class section were reproduced from pen and ink sketches by Bonny Boettcher and Marsha Broadus. The charcoal portrait on page 8 is the contribution of the Editor.

ENDSHEETS. The Homecoming Court pictured on the pink duotone endsheets were posed on the steps of Beauvoir, home of the President of the Confederacy, Jefferson Davis.

THE BOOK is published by Myers Year Books, Inc. of Topeka, Kansas. The 8" X 10" pages of fine grade enamel paper were printed on offset press and bound in 10 sixteen-page signatures, symthesewn for added strength.
