Homecoming 1983

Alumni honor banker

Sometimes the burning taper of one small deed lights the way to a lifetime of selfless service to humankind

It happened that way to John Dees during the dark, lean years of the Great Depression

There was a black family living in the Mississippi Delta who wanted to come home to Perkinston. They had been tenant farmers and now were destitute. My father sent me to get them, Dees recalls. He continues.

When I got to Arcola, driving an open truck, I found waiting for me a grandmother and a widowed mother and her nine children. They didn't have a nickel among them.

We packed all their possessions in the truck and they climbed on top-limagine we looked like something from the 'Grapes of Wrath

When we arrived in Vicksburg, I stopped and bought a dozen hamburgers and soft drinks to go with them. That was the last time we are until we got to Perkinston about 2.30 the next morning.

Those people were so overjoyed that someone cared about them. Seeing that happiness made an impression on me. It was then that I became interested in helping people in need.

Earlier at the banquet, T.L. Davis, president of the Bank of Wiggins, announced that two perpetual \$500 scholarships in tribute to Dees and MGCJC have been established by the bank's board of directors.


The scholarships will be awarded each year "as a token payment to a man who has spent most of his adult life helping fellow humans," said Davis

Jones ends dream of bowl bid

For the second time in a row. Coach George Sekul's Gulf Coast Buildogs in 1983 were knocked out of a national bowl bid. This time their undoing was a 17-12 loss to Jones in the state championship football game at Pascagoula.

At stake, in addition to the fifle, was an invitation to the East Bowl a regional game sanctioned by the National Junior College Athletic Association. Jones hosted the affair at Ellisville and won if The year before, the Bulldogs tied Northwest 7-7 to share the state title. But it was the Rangers and not Gulf Coast who went to the 1982 bowl and captured the National championship.

Gulf Coast went into the game against Jones with a 10-1 record, good enough to be first in South Division Conference

Even after the loss, the Bulldogs were ranked ninth in the

nation by the NJCAA and 13th by Grid-Wire of California

The team also was ranked first in rushing offense and seventh in passing defense. Individual players drew their share of national recognition, too.

Among them were guard Kenneth Bourgeois of Harvey, La, who made the NJCAA first team All-American and Grid Wire's second team

Others were defensive end Randall Webster, first on Grid-Wire's All-American team and second on NJCAA's squad, running back Eddie Collins, honorable mention by the NJCAA and by Grid-Wire, and punter/kicker Kirk Basone, second nationally among the top 10 punters and an honorable mention All-American by both rating bureaus. All are from Gulfport

Bourgeois, Webster and Collins were first team picks in the NJCAA's Regional XIII. They also were selected the Most Valuable Players in the Mississippi Junior College Conference.

And, for the second straight year and the third time careerwise. Sekul was named Coach of the Year in the region



At yearbook deadline time in late January, Gulf Coast's men's basketball team was ranked second in the South Division behind conference leader Co-Lin


The Buildog's record was 15-4 overall and 6-2 in the South with five regular season games remaining

And in January of 1984, the venerable Farris was named by the United States Federation of Baseball to its sixman pool to accompany United States teams playing baseball overseas.






