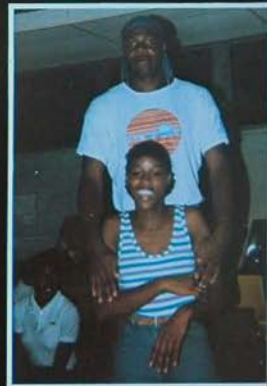

ACADEMICS

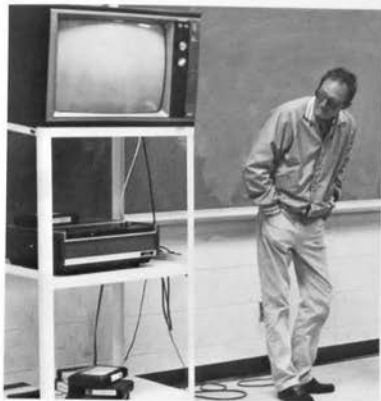




Meeting the individual needs of students represent a great responsibility to the Department of Business Administration. They help students plan their courses to successfully meet the challenges of today's business world.

Vocational-technical programs are designed to meet the needs of students seeking employment in areas not requiring a four-year degree.

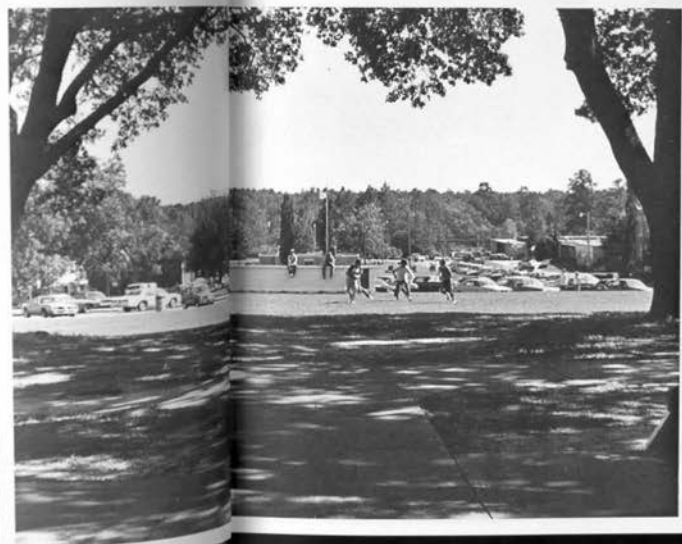




Students in vocational education at the George County Occupational Training Center will have a saleable skill upon their completion of course work.

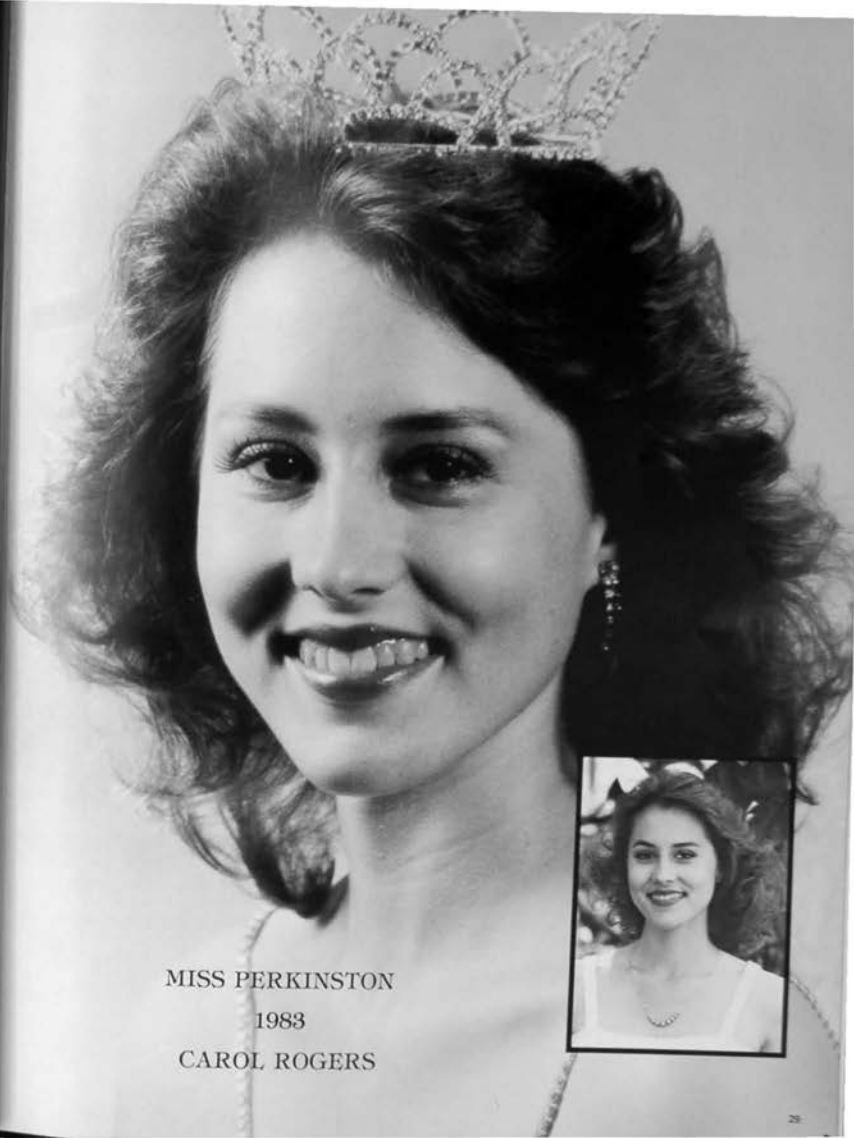
Students enjoy the Halloween festivities provided with the help of the Andrews Hall staff. Open dorms are one of many functions the resident assistants perform.

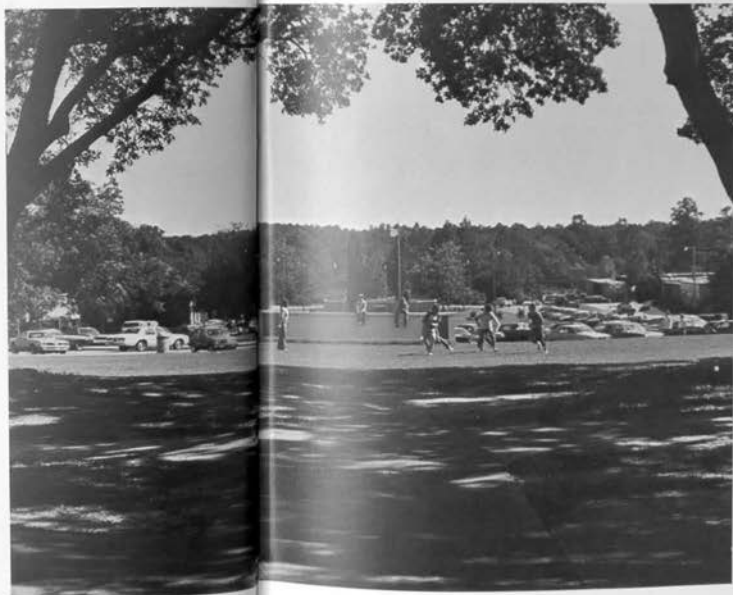

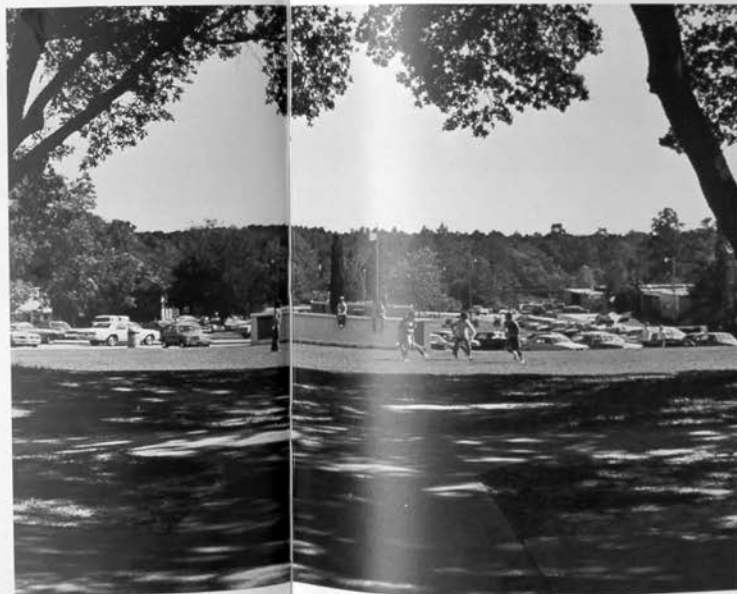

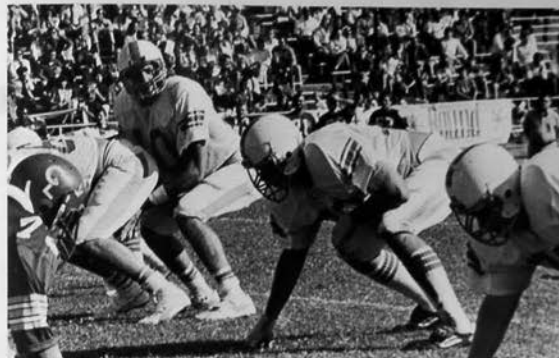

They posted a 26-5 record and were the No. 1 defensive team in Region 23 of the National Junior College Athletic Association. In the NJCAA regional tournament, GC was runner up to Co-Lin, the team the Bulldogs had beaten earlier to win the South title.

Alumni honor banker

Sometimes the burning taper of one small deed lights the way to a lifetime of selfless service to humankind.

It happened that way to John Dees during the dark, lean years of the Great Depression.

There was a black family living in the Mississippi Delta who wanted to come home to Perkinston. They had been tenant farmers and now were destitute. My father sent me to get them, Dees recalls. He continues:

When I got to Arcola, driving an open truck, I found waiting for me a grandmother and a widowed mother and her nine children. They didn't have a nickel among them.

We packed all their possessions in the truck and they climbed on top. I imagine we looked like something from the 'Grapes of Wrath'.

When we arrived in Vicksburg, I stopped and bought a dozen hamburgers and soft drinks to go with them. That was the last time we ate until we got to Perkinston about 2:30 the next morning.

Those people were so overjoyed that someone cared about them. Seeing that happiness made an impression on me. It was then that I became interested in helping people in need.



John Clifton Dees

Hall of Fame inductee

John Clifton Dees, Bank of Wiggins board chairman and retired businessman, was inducted into the Mississippi Gulf Coast Junior College Hall of Fame on November 5, 1983.

A 1931 graduate of what is now Perkinston Campus, Dees became the 14th recipient of the award, presented to him by GGCJC President Dr. J.J. Hayden, Jr. at a homecoming banquet at Perkinston.

In accepting the award, Dees said he has "always believed that an education is a good investment, but that a junior college education is still the best bargain."

Dees was born in 1912, the same year the Harrison County Agricultural High School (now the Perkinston Campus) began operation. And for more than 44 years he lived in its shadow.

He told the more than 400 guests who had assembled to pay him homage that he was "supervisor of the barnyard" when he was a student at Gulf Coast. "The job taught me two things," he said, "how to be a supervisor and to watch my step."

For 30 years Dees served as a Stone County supervisor, claiming the office in the first primary for eight consecutive terms.

"I am proud of this college and its leadership — it's the best (junior college) in the state," proclaimed Dees.

A staunch supporter of GGCJC, Dees helped students to obtain their first two years of college before scholarships were known. He continues to contribute a full scholarship each year and coordinates another full scholar-

ship from the Bank of Wiggins.

Earlier at the banquet, T.L. Davis, president of the Bank of Wiggins, announced that two perpetual \$500 scholarships in tribute to Dees and GGCJC have been established by the bank's board of directors.

The scholarships will be awarded each year "as a token payment to a man who has spent most of his adult life helping fellow humans," said Davis.

Dees, a humanitarian in his own right, always found time to be involved in civic affairs and to help his community. Some of the visible things resulting from his untiring efforts are the Stone County Library, the Stone County Office Building, Flint Creek Water Park, International Paper Company and the Mental Health Center in Gulfport.

Jones ends dream of bowl bid

For the second time in a row, Coach George Sekul's Gulf Coast Bulldogs in 1983 were knocked out of a national bowl bid. This time their undoing was a 17-12 loss to Jones in the state championship football game at Pascagoula.

At stake, in addition to the title, was an invitation to the East Bowl, a regional game sanctioned by the National Junior College Athletic Association. Jones hosted the affair at Ellisville and won it.

The year before, the Bulldogs tied Northwest 7-7 to share the state title. But it was the Rangers and not Gulf Coast who went to the 1982 bowl and captured the National championship.

Gulf Coast went into the game against Jones with a 10-1 record, good enough to be first in South Division Conference play.

Even after the loss, the Bulldogs were ranked ninth in the

At yearbook presstime, Coach Ken Farris was reading his 1984 baseball team for another go at the state title. The goal was barely missed in 1983 when the Bulldogs lost to Northwest in the state playoffs.

But 39 wins against 15 losses and the South Division championship were nothing to be ashamed of. The season pushed Farris' 21-year career record to an impressive 539 wins against a mere 152 defeats.

The winning ways of Farris-coached

teams include 13 state and 19 division championships, an achievement unequalled in the annals of Mississippi junior college baseball and one of the best coaching records in the nation.

Bulldog players who won honors in 1983 were pitcher Doug Bories of Biloxi and infielder Van Graham of Pascagoula. Both were named to the National Junior College Athletic Association's Region XXIII All-Star team.

Recognition also came Farris' way. In the summer of 1983 he was one of the coaches picked nationwide to coach in the United States Olympic Committee's National Sports Festival in Colorado Springs.

And in January of 1984, the venerable Farris was named by the United States Federation of Baseball to its six-man pool to accompany United States teams playing baseball overseas.
