
















Tri-Campus Farewell Ball







Electronics students build super projects

Four electronics students at Jackson County Campus received top honors in electronics for their sophomore project.

George Ellis and Steven Smith, both of Gulfport, received top robotics honors while Deborah Hensley of Biloxi and Joe Windham of Gulfport were named for overall excellence in electronics.

According to instructor James Christine, sophomores in the two year program are required to build a project from scratch which has a minimum of three functions. Some build robots and others build electronics projects.


Robotics, instrumentation control, laser communications systems and optical fibers have been added to the curriculum in recent years to keep up with the constantly changing field.

Machine shop instructor enjoys job

"Old machinists never die...they just get bored."

This saying is on the wall of machine shop instructor Robert Hudson's office. But, Hudson is far from being bored for he has been awarded the title of MGCJC Jackson County Campus Instructor of the Year.

Hudson was nominated by his students and other faculty and was honored at the Alumni Association Spring Banquet at the Jefferson Davis Campus April 27.

The machine shop instructor has been with Jackson County Campus for eight years and has been working with machines for 30. According to Hudson, when he first began working with machines, it was totally by chance.

He has just finished basic training and was assigned to work with machines by the Navy. This job required working with raw materials and cutting, shaping, or forming them into useful parts, which are used in all mechanical mechanisms (the skill in which he is presently teaching).

After retiring from the Navy, he applied for a machine shou instructor job at JC and within a month he was accepted to fill a vacant spot. When the new instructor first began, he had six students. Now he is proud to say that the course averages 26-30 students per semester, with most of them graduating and working in major corporations.

Hudson has also recently received his Masters Degree by attending school at night while teaching during the day. But accomplishing this feat and winning the Instructor of the Year Award are not Hudson's only rewards. Three years ago, he placed first in the state in a Machines Trade NOCTI Exam. This was an optional test, but Hudson feels that in the future, all machine instructors will be required to take it.

One of the new programs at JC is computer machinery, which was one of the first on the Coast. This program is designed to print patterns, programmed into a computer, on to a metal surface.

Hudson is married and has four children. He makes his home in Ocean Springs.

As for being named JC Instructor of the Year, Hudson simply said, "It was the students who recognized me, and that meant a lot to me. It was reward enough just to be nominated." — Allison Brown

Alumni honor banker

Sometimes the burning taper of one small deed lights the way to a lifetime of selfless service to humankind.

It happened that way to John Dees during the dark, lean years of the Great Depression.

There was a black family living in the Mississippi Delta who wanted to come home to Perkinston. They had been tenant farmers and now were destitute. My father sent me to get them, Dees recalls. He continues:

When I got to Arcola, driving an open truck, I found waiting for me a grandmother and a widowed mother and her nine children. They didn't have a nickel among them.

We packed all their possessions in the truck and they climbed on top. I imagine we looked like something from the 'Grapes of Wrath'.

When we arrived in Vicksburg, I stopped and bought a dozen hamburgers and soft drinks to go with them. That was the last time we ate until we got to Perkinston about 2:30 the next morning.

we are until we got to Perkinston about 2.30 the next morning. Those people were so overjoyed that someone cared about them. Seeing that happiness made an impression on me. It was then that I became interested in helping people in need.

John Clifton Dees Hall of Fame inductee

John Clifton Dees, Bank of Wiggins board chairman and retired businessman, was inducted into the Mississippi Gulf Coast Junior College Hall of Fame on November 5, 1983.

A 1931 graduate of what is now Perkinston Campus, Dees became the 14th recipient of the award, presented to him by GCJC President Dr. J.J. Hayden, Jr. at a homecoming banquet at Perkinston.

In accepting the award, Dees said he has "always believed that an education is a good investment, but that a junior college education is still the best bargain."

Dees was born in 1912, the same year the Harrison County Agricultural High School (now the Perkinston Campus) began operation. And for more than 44 years he lived in its shadow.

He told the more than 400 guests who had assembled to pay him homage that he was "supervisor of the barnyard" when he was a student at Gulf Coast. "The job taught me two things," he said, "how to be a supervisor and to watch my step."

For 30 years Dees served as a Stone County supervisor, claiming the office in the first primary for eight consecutive terms,

"I am proud of this college and its leadership — it's the best (junior college) in the state," proclaimed Dees.

A staunch supporter of MGCJC, Dees helped students to obtain their first two years of college before scholarships were known. He continues to contribute a full scholarship each year and coordinates another full scholar ship from the Bank of Wiggins.

Earlier at the banquet, T.L. Davis, president of the Bank of Wiggins, announced that two perpetual \$500 scholarships in tribute to Dees and MGCJC have been established by the bank's board of directors.

The scholarships will be awarded each year "as a token payment to a man who has spent most of his adult life helping fellow humans," said Davie

Dees, a humanitarian in his own right, always found time to be involved in civic affairs and to help his community. Some of the visible things resulting from his untiling efforts are the Stone County Library, the Stone County Office Building, Flint Creek Water Pak, International Paper Company and the Mental Health Center in Guliport.

Hague, immediate past president of MGCJC Alumni Association, was cited for exceptional service to the college through his work with the alumni and foundation. He was introduced by college president Dr. J.J. Hayden, Jr.

Having served two consecutive terms as district alumni president, Hague previously served as first and second district vice president and as president of the Jackson County alumni chapter. While district president, he was an honorary member of the Foundation Board of Directors.

Hague is employed by the National Marine Fisheries Service as Fishery Report Specialist, a position he has held more than 30 years.
