GERALDINE FERRARO MAKES HISTORY IN 1984

Geraldine A. Ferraro was elected to the 96th Congress in 1978 and won re-election in 1980 and 1982. A Democrat, she is the first woman Representative from Queens. Ferraro was born on August 26, 1935 in Newburgh, New York. She attended Marymount School and graduated from Marymount Manhattan College in 1956. She taught in the New York public school system while putting herself through law school at night. She obtained her law degree from Fordham University School of Law in 1960. Between 1961 and 1974, Ms. Ferraro maintained a private law practice. From 1974 to 1978, she served as Assistant District Attorney in Queens County.

Ms. Ferraro was a past member of the Advisory Council for Housing Court of New York City, President of Queen County Women's Bar Association, House Budget Committee, Secretary for the House Democratic Caucus, Democratic Steering and Policy Committee, House Committee on Public Works and Transportation, Select Committee on Aging, Task Force on Women and Social Security, Executive Board member of the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues, Board of Visitors of Merchant Marine Academy, Executive Board of Congressional Arts Caucus and Steering Committee of the Northeast Midwest Coalition, Board of Directors of Marymount Manhattan College, her alma mater, which in 1982 awarded her an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters Degree. In 1984, she was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree by New York Law School. In January, 1984, Ferraro was named Chair of the Democratic Platform Committee for the 1984 national convention. Ferraro and her husband, John Zaccaro, a businessman, have three children, Donna, John Jr. and Laura. They live in Forest Hills.

Ms. Ferraro will always be remembered as being the first woman to be nominated to the nation's second highest office, Vice President of the United States.

Football

The MGCJC Bulldogs began their 1984 football season with three goals in mind: an undefeated regular season, a State Championship, and a National Championship. Amid the talk of gold rings they managed to achieve all three, a feat matched by only one other MGCJC team, Gulf Coast's first National Championship was won 13 years earlier by a team that Head Coach Sekul deemed, "the best team I've ever coached." When asked how the 1984 squad compared, he commented, "they're every bit as good!"

The long journey toward national recognition began with an over-night trip to Moorhead, MS to play the Mississippi Delta Trojans, and ended four months later with an 11-hundred mile trip to Harford, MD against the Harford Community College Owls. Along the course of the season the Bulldogs faced many tough challenges, often coming from behind to win, but they emerged victorious from each. Their ability to snatch victory from the jaws to defeat proved that they were truly winners. Many of the players credit the student body with helping them over the rough spots, commenting, "With the support of the students behind us, we knew we couldn't lose!"

The National Championship belongs to the football players, but it also belongs to the student body. The 1984 junior college football season will long be remembered in Mississippi and in the nation as "The Year of the Dawgs!"



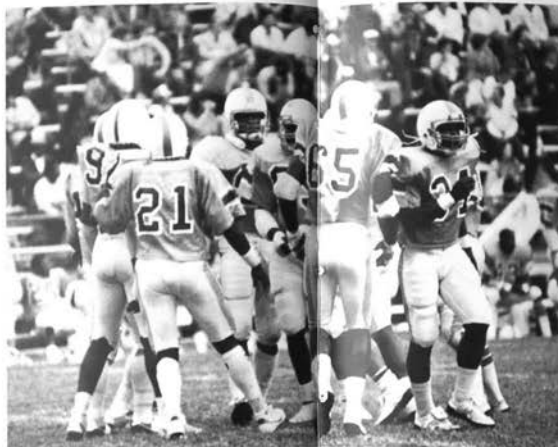
Head Coach George Sekul, Assistant Coaches Clem Dellenger and Mike Neilson led the Gulf Coast Bulldogs to the National Championship at the close of the 1984 Season. Sekul's impressive 167-37-4 record included 8 state championships and 2 national championships.

The Bulldogs rallied to overcome Pearl River and Itawamba to keep play-off hopes alive. Perfection did not come easy throughout a tough season, but the Dogs ended regular season play with an unblemished 10-0 record.

As the countdown in the playoffs continued, Gulf Coast blasted off and rolled over the East Mississippi Junior College Lions in a 50-7 victory before a large hometown crowd. The Lions only managed to gain 171 total yards against a tough defensive stand, while Perk gained 492 yards with impressive offensive plays.

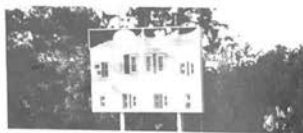
"Not this year Jones — we want revenge!" And revenge has never tasted sweeter as Gulf Coast came away with a 17-16 victory over Jones to clinch a state championship. Jones was also defeated earlier in the season 21-12 by the Bulldogs. After a scoreless first half, Gulf Coast held on to win the State and Region XXIII Championship.

Gulf Coast finished a shining 13-0 season by defeating Harford Community College 21-17 in the East Bowl and laid claim to the National Junior College Championship. Congratulations Gulf Coast!

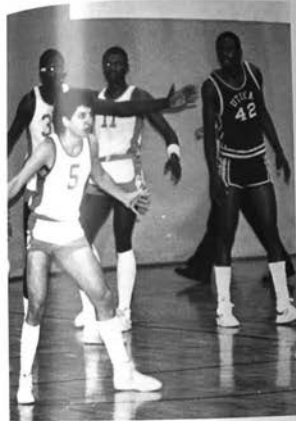
Men's Basketball

He attended Ole Miss during the "glory days" and played under Johnny Vaught from 1962 to 1966. While at Ole Miss he was a part of the 1962 National Championship team and the 1964 Sugar Bowl.

After graduating in '66 he coached at McComb High school from 1966 to 1967. From there he moved to Moss Point and coached from 1968-1970. He came to MGCJC in 1977 and coached the offensive and defensive lines until his decision to leave in 1984. "I've enjoyed being here at Perk and working with everyone. It was a hard decision to make, but it's a step up in my profession." He also stated that he enjoyed this year more than any other as a coach. When asked about going to Pearl River and what effect that will have on the rivalry he stated, "It won't make it any less. Perk will want to win." And when asked who will win the Perk vs. Pearl River game next year he replied, "I will pull for Perk every game but one, and I'm going to go my best to win!"

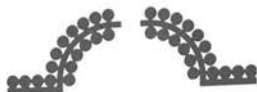

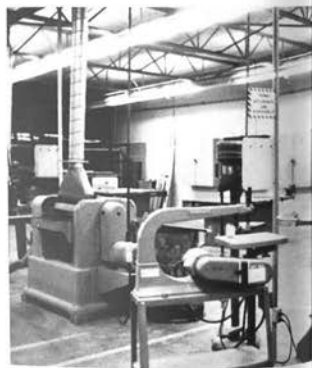

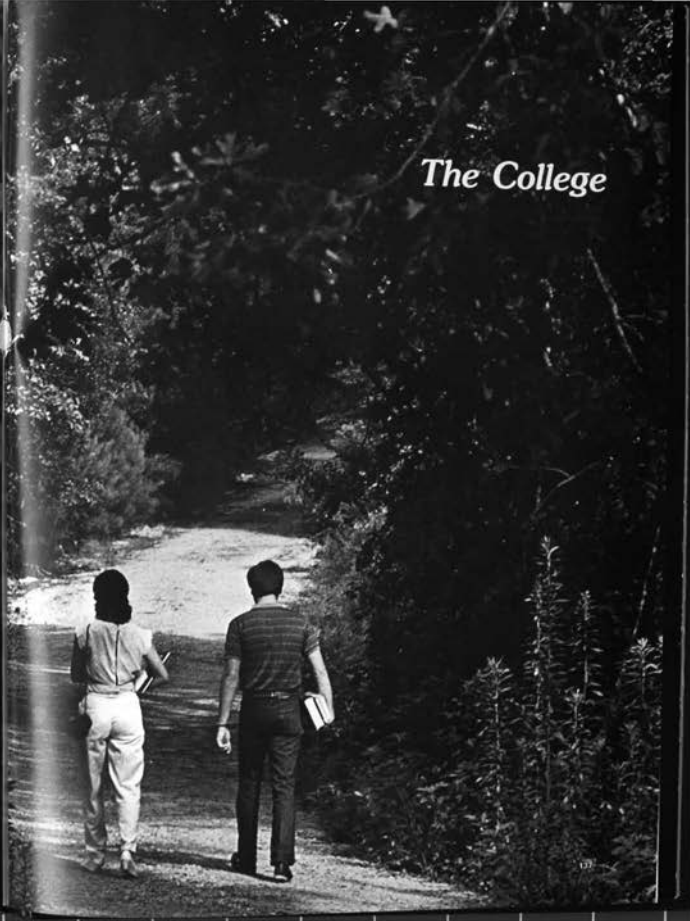

Bulldogs win state championship Lady 'dogs have disappointing season

Bob Weathers and his 'dogs had an overall record in mid-February of 10-8 and 5-4 in the South, with five games remaining. It was a disappointing showing compared to last year's 26-0 record and state championship title.

Meanwhile, Coach Doris Smith and her Lady 'dogs were holding third place and fighting for a higher berth in the South Division after coming off a poor season last year. To date they were 10-4 overall and 4-4 in the South.

Leading the team in scoring was Darlene Watts of Gulfport, who averaged 17 points, 16 rebounds and three steals a game. Other outstanding Lady 'dogs were Dina Fountain of D'Iberville, who averaged 11.9 points, six rebounds, nine assists and 25 steals; Rhonda Hickman of Wiggins, with 13 points, 11 rebounds and six steals; and Denise McDonald of Biloxi with 10 points, 12 rebounds and three steals.

In addition to leading his men to the 1984 state title, Weathers was named Coach of the Year by the junior college

basketball coaches in Mississippi. He also received the Babe McCarthy Tip-Off Club award.

Considered to be one of the winningest junior college basketball coaches in the nation, Weathers has compiled to date a 24-year career record at Gulf Coast of 528 wins and 170 losses. He ranks ninth in the nation in all-time win-loss records.

Since coming to Gulf Coast, Weathers has guided his teams to six state championships and to the runner-up slot on five occasions. He has coached 10 South Division championship teams and has been in second place five times.

Outstanding Bulldogs last year include Troy Biju, 6-8 guard from New Orleans, All-Region 23; Rocky Evans, 6-0 guard from Pascagoula, and Clarence Gray, 6-6 forward from LaPlace, La., both selected for the All-Star game and to the All-State first team.

State Champion Bulldogs ...

Pluck Owls to Win National Title

A spectator sitting in the bleachers on the home-side of the football field at Bel Air has an almost unobstructed view of the rolling Maryland countryside.

And even on a cold, wind-whipped day in December, the scenery was eye-catching.

Only on this particular day, it is unlikely many of the 3,000 or so fans paid much attention to the pastoral beauty of the place.

They had come to watch a football game.

Football, Mississippi style, is what they saw as the top-ranked Gulf Coast Junior College Bulldogs claimed the 1984 national championship by defeating second-place Harford 21-7 in the sixth annual East Bowl.

It was the 13th win of the season for the undefeated Bulldogs, who handed Coach George Sekul his second National Junior College Athletic Association title in 13 years.

"No one did it better," is the way an editorial in a Coast newspaper summed up the Bulldogs, "achievement of athletic excellence."

But achievement of this magnitude didn't come easy. And the quest for it almost ended at Perkinson in the state championship game against the Jones Bobcats.

A goal line stand on fourth down, with the ball only inches away from six points, enabled the Bulldogs to eke out the 17-16 victory that assured them of a crack at the national title.

Nine days later the Bulldogs were on a bus, headed for Bel Air—a thousand miles away. Later in the week they were followed by buses, vans and cars loaded with the Marching Band of Gold, the Perkers, cheerleaders and about a hundred faithful fans.

The victory—

"... Reporters and photographers were poised on the sidelines, ready to capture the game's every play. On the field (the Gulf Coast) marching band, brightly dressed in blue and gold, moved snappily to its own festive music ...

"... A plane circled overhead, trailing a banner which crowed, 'Go Owls—Harford's Best.'"

"(But) Harford's best wasn't quite good enough ... (Yet) the event will still be remembered as the day big-time college football came to Harford County."

Writing in the Sunday, Dec. 2, edition of The Sun/Daily Herald, Slim Smith recounted the highlights of the game.

"The Bulldogs rolled up 364 yards, including 254 rushing yards, thanks primarily to the efforts of hard running backs James Evans and Allen Williams ...

"Harford, meanwhile, relied almost exclusively on the exceptional talents of tailback Charles Johnson, who rushed 37 times for 206 yards ...

"Gulf Coast's defense never really

held the Owls offense in check, but it really didn't have to. The Bulldogs turned to takeaways to stem the tide, picking off three passes and recovering a fumble.

"The first Owls turnover ... set the stage (at the 24) for what was to follow. 'If there was a key play, that was it,' Sekul said.

"The Bulldogs recovered for the Bulldogs and Gulf Coast marched 25 yards in five plays to take the lead. Evans crashed over from the 6, then added a 2-point conversion run for an 8-0 lead ...

"The Bulldogs quickly boosted their lead to 21-0 with quarterback Anthony (Shake-and-Fake) Harris hitting tight end Gary Taylor on (two) TD strikes ...

"Bobby Ogle broke up an Owls' first period scoring threat with an interception at the Bulldog 15. Then, Danny Harris stopped another Harford drive with an interception at the Gulf Coast 8. Henry picked off another pass in the fourth period ...

Like the editorial writer said: 'No one did it better.'
