Dr. J. J. Hayden, Jr. President Emeritus

Dr. J. J. Hayden Jr., president emeritus of Mississippi Gulf Coast Junior College, was the 17th alumnus to be Inducted into the school's Alumni Hall of Fame, Nov. 1, 1996.

Hayden, a 1939 graduate of what is now MGCJC's Perkinston Campus, served as the college's chief executive officer for 32 years.

Conducting the ceremony for the veteran educator was his successor, Dr. Barry L. Mellinger.

In his response, Hayden paid tribute "to the people who were instrumental" in helping him build the first multi-campus Junior College in the state and one of the first in the nation.

"People made it possible for me to achieve what I have accomplished," Haydan said. "... and I predict the college will continue to grow because of people who care."

Hayden's career with the college began when he returned to his alma mater in 1950 as instructor of history. In 1952, he became dean of men and a year later was appointed president, at age 33 the youngest man ever named to the post.

It was under his leadership that the coilege grew from the small rural school of 800 students to the coilege it is today with three campuses and four centers — and nearly 8,000 students.

But in attaining the presidency, the high point in his career, the Pass Christian native traveled a circuitous route that included service in the U.S. Coast Guard during World War II.

After his discharge, he "went to Maine to seek my fortune, but after two years of smelling serdines and other fish and freezing in the winter, I decided there had to be a better way to earn a living."

In quest of the better way, Hayden enrolled at Mississipp State University, were he received a bachelor's degree in secondary education and a master's in history. He earned the doctorate at the University of Southern Mississippi.

Hayden today is "taking it easy" with his wife Lillian in the new house they built at Pass Christian. Later he would like to work part time as a junior college consultant.

"Helping a college solve its problems, the way people helped me — that would be a real challenge."

He served as supervisor of District 2 for 34 years, was president of the Jackson County board for 15 years and was executive secretary of the Mississippi Association of Supervisors for 24

The Owen Award was established in 1956 by Sam Owen, a Perkinston Campus alumnus from Gulfport, who died in Hurricane Camille. It was continued by members of his family.

The crushing blow as a 14-yard looping pass delivered by quarterback Danny Kelly of d'Iberville as he was being decked by several onrushing defenders. Jones had to come back to the ball to make the catch.

The decisive extra point was kicked by Adethsack Chanthavane of Mobile, who then ran to near midfield and dropped to his knees with his arms raised toward his bench.

It was a magnificent finish for the Bulldogs, who early in the season seemed unable to "get it together". But get it together they did and wound up second in the South Divi-

In the playoff, Gulf Coast defeated the North Division leader Itawamba 20-16 in a gully washer at Fulton. The Bulldogs captured the state title by upsetting Northwest 14-13.

The East Bowl victory gave the Bulldogs an overall 10-3 season. And it gave Coach George Sekul his eighth state title in 21 years at Gulf Coast and assured the Bulldogs of the berth in the East Bowl, one of seven post-season bowl games sanctioned by the National Junior College Athletic Association.

Sekul ended the season with an overall career record of 186 wins, 41 losses and 4 ties. The East Bowl was his 4th bowl win. He also has two national championships to his cred-


