## Eleuterius - 18th to Hall of Fame

Dr. Lionel Eleuterius, head of the botany section at Gulf Coast Research Laboratory, was the 18th inductee into the Alumni Association Hall of Fame.

He was presented with the award, along with an art supply kit, at a homecoming luncheon at the Perkinston Campus.

Eleuterius, a 1958 alumnus, has been at GCRL since 1963, right after receiving his master's degree in botany from the University of Southern Mississippi.

In his response, Eleuterius said the award was "especially meaningful, because it comes from a common heritage."

The featured speaker at the luncheon was Mrs. Della McLaughan, Eleuterius' Biloxi High School biology teacher to whom he dedicated his book *Tidal Marsh Plants*.

When working with the Corps of Engineers in the early '70s, Eleuterius and his staff learned a great deal about "sea oats," plants that can be used to control sand erosion of beaches. More recently, he and his staff have studied application of the plants to Mississippi's beaches.
