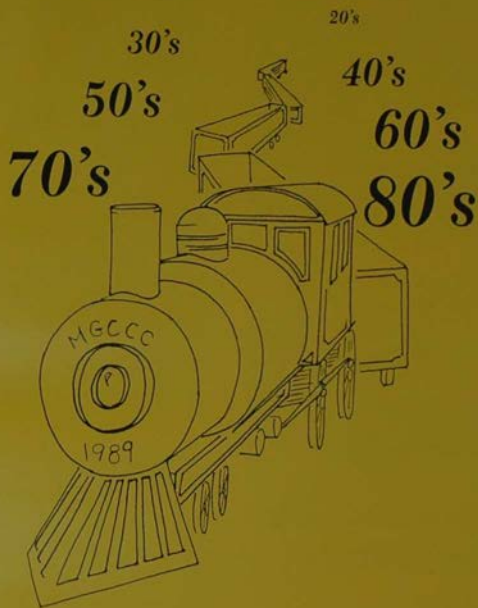

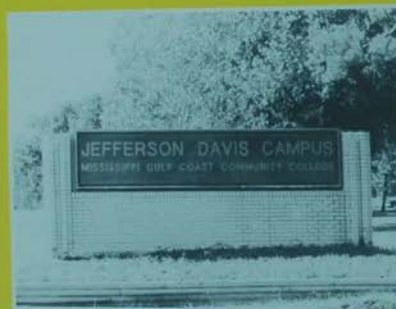

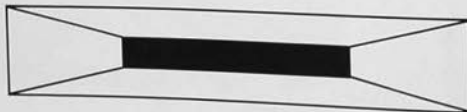


Ashleigh Smith is crowned homecoming queen.

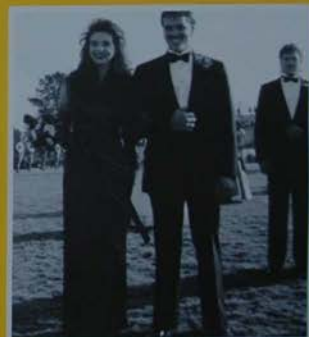

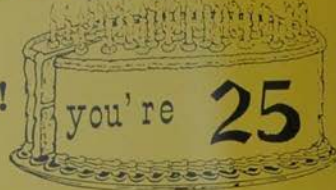

On Tuesday, November 14, 1989, Jefferson Davis Campus celebrated its 25th birthday, and the NEA (National Education Association) honored the faculty and staff who have been here since its opening in 1964. With only 29 full-time instructors, J.D.'s first semester carried a student body of about 630. Now J.D. has grown from a small junior college to a full-blown community college of academic achievement and an active vo-tech program. Enrollment is at an all-time high, and over 90 full-time instructors are employed.

## Into the 90's . . .



## THE NEW DECADE

For the western world, the 19th Century was a Golden Age of magnificent creativity and progress. Standards of living were rising, slavery was abolished, democracy was expanded, beautiful poetry was written, enduring music was composed and fundamental new discoveries were made in science. At the turn of the century, it seemed the Golden Age would last forever and the fondest dreams of the visionary idealist would be translated into pragmatic reality.

Then an ominous shade of darkening clouds blew over the bright Victorian skies. Prosperity gave way to ruin, security to insecurity, stability to instability, and faith in inevitable progress to the doubt of survival. Never had such bright hopes been so ruthlessly shattered.

The final tragedy came on the brutal battlefields of World War I where the best and brightest young men of a generation were slaughtered by the millions. When that long, terrible night of horrible conflict finally ended, thoughtful people were shocked and disillusioned by the barbarism of that war. Modern man came face to face with himself as a stranger; alienated to nature, to God and now to himself. As a result of this tragedy, there rises in the mind the awful vision of the elegance and beauty of the modern civilization as nothing more than a gaudy floral decoration papered over the abyss of human ferocity and greed, according to Henry James.

Thus, World War I looms as the great watershed of the 20th Century and the matrix of the violence, pessimism, totalitarianism and genocide that have characterized our world and our time. For too long we have lived in the terror of a final nuclear war that would consume us all in a fiery holocaust. And then the final epitaph of a species that had named themselves *Homo sapiens* (intelligent beings) would be that we, and we alone, unlike other victims of extinction, had foolishly and unnecessarily caused our own premature extinction.

Now, as we begin the 10th decade of the 20th Century, there is a ray of genuine hope for the first time since World War I. A small break has appeared in the dark clouds of pessimism and fear. Today humanity stands at a gigantic crossroads in history. Our choice is between death and life. If we continue the blind, aggressive, ethnocentric, senseless behavior of the past, it is only a matter of time before we destroy ourselves. Excitingly, though, there is another choice that leads toward cooperation, prosperity, and life. And all around us there are hopeful new trends and possibilities that need to be cherished and cultivated.

Modern students are becoming more tolerant and more accepting of each other and more receptive to new ideas. Today's students are becoming better informed about current events and more interested in politics. These positive trends among our students are very encouraging because they can lead to better government, a better society, and a better world.

Economically, we are evolving a global economy that can lead to greater opportunity for all and can serve as a logical basis for cooperation among nations. In 1992 the Europeans hope to create a new economic union comparable to the United States and Japan. This European entity could be a model economic cooperation for other regions of the world like Central America, the Middle East, and Southeast Asia.

Another positive trend for the nineties and beyond is that technology with improving means of communication and travel is reducing the whole world to a global village. Soon people will be able to travel to any point on earth in the time required now to drive from the Gulf Coast to New

Orleans. Furthermore, through evolving global networks of communication, all the world's people will share more of the same information and the same art and culture. Most importantly, these new realities of travel and communication will decisively change how people think. It will make the old ethnocentrism of the past forever obsolete and will usher in new opportunities for human sharing and understanding. Then as humans begin to explore and colonize space, their perspectives of thought will be broadened even more, and many of the old conflicts of earth, viewed from the vantage point of spacial immensity and infinity, will appear silly and childish.

Other very positive news comes from the recent decline of bloody local wars. The vicious Iran-Iraq War has ended, and the brutal Afghan War has stopped. Of historic significance, the long costly and dangerous Cold War may be winding down to a conclusion. What a giant step that could be in building a more peaceful and secure world! It could also relieve the United States and the world from a terrible economic burden of military spending that has almost bankrupted us all. Maybe then, in the new decade of the nineties, we can find more funds for education, health, cleaning the environment, housing the homeless, and rebuilding our crumbling streets, highways and schools.

We must not allow the new opportunities to build a better and more peaceful world in the nineties to pass by and to fail. The choice is ours, and the responsibility is ours. Our destiny is in our hands. Indeed, this generation has a rendezvous with destiny. To paraphrase John F. Kennedy, if we cannot now end our differences, let us at least make the world safe for diversity. For, in the final analysis, we all inhabit the same planet; we all breathe the same air; we are all mortal, and most of us cherish the future of our children. So the torch is now being passed to you and your generation. It is now your opportunity to reshape America, the world, and yourselves. What will you do with America and the world? History awaits your response. And as you contemplate your future, the words of Berton Braley seem appropriate:

With doubt and dismay you are smitten,  
You think there's no chance for youth, Son?  
Why the best books haven't been written;  
The best race hasn't been won,  
The best score hasn't been made yet,  
The best song hasn't been played yet;  
Cheer up, for the world is young!

Why, the world is just eager for things you ought to create,  
Its store of true wealth is still meager,  
Its needs are insistent and great.

Don't worry and fret, faint hearted,  
The chances have just begun.  
For the best jobs haven't been started,  
The best work hasn't been done.

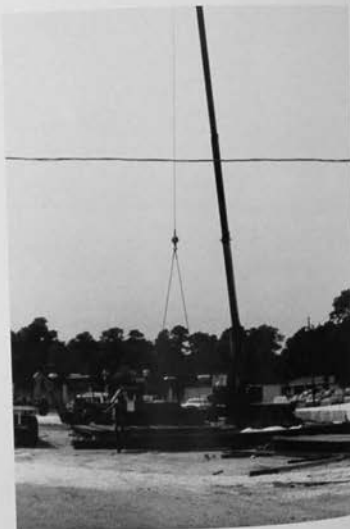

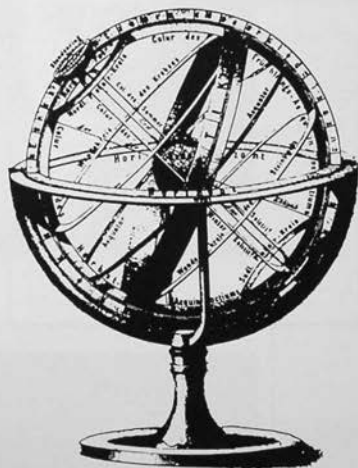

## District Celebrates 25th Year

# Trustees Keep Up the Pace

This was an eventful year for the devoted and insightful Gulf Coast Board of Trustees. Now in its 25th year as a multi-campus institution, Gulf Coast is still growing and changing to better meet the needs and demands of its four-county district. Neither growth nor new ideas could happen without the approval and careful planning of the 25-member board.

The unanimously reelected officers leading the group are Wilbur Ward of Lucedale, chairman of the board; Jean Peden of Gulfport, first vice chair; John R. Dedeaux of Perkinston, second vice chair; Dr. Frank Gruch of Biloxi, secretary; and Frank Hamilton of Hurley, treasurer.

One hurdle they and other trustees cleared with grace was the issue of representation on the board. Fairness and deliberation led to the addition of three new representatives from Jackson County — Don Massengale, industrial relations director at Ingalls Shipbuilding; J. B. George, retired employee of the Alpo Plant; and Harry Roberts, executive vice president of First Federal Savings and Loan in Pascagoula.

Prior to the school year, Gulf Coast's accreditation was reaffirmed by the South-

ern Association of Colleges and Schools. That bright spot seemed to serve as both a reminder of the college's objective and an inspiration to continue progress for the people it serves.

Progress is continuing throughout the district. Several building projects are underway, the biggest being the \$2.2 million Mississippi Gulf Coast Applied Technology and Development Center under construction in the Intraplex 10 Industrial Park in Gulfport. This joint venture with Mississippi Power Company, the state Department of Education Vocational Division and the Harrison County Development Commission is the first of its kind in Mississippi and among the first in the nation.

Other construction under way includes new classrooms, a child care facility and an economic development center on the Jackson County Campus; an Allied Health program facility on the Jefferson Davis Campus and renovations and additions to several older buildings on the Perkinston Campus.

The board always works with college president Dr. Barry L. Mellinger and the college executive council to maintain and approve upon quality in all areas of the

college — including instructional programs, support services and community involvement.

A 10-year projection plan is in the works at Gulf Coast, but the actions of the Board of Trustees indicate that the foremost plan now is to keep growing to serve Harrison, Stone, Jackson and George counties as effectively as possible while moving toward the new millennium.

# Coming home to the Perkinson Campus

On October 28, Dr. Doyle Preston Smith of Jackson became the 19th recipient of the GCGC Alumni Hall of Fame award.

Smith, a 1944 alumnus of what is now Perkinson Campus, is medical director at the Jackson Recovery Center, a drug and alcohol treatment center. He is world-renowned in the field of addictionology.

Smith holds a B.S. in entomology from Mississippi State University, where he also did some post-graduate work. He graduated from the Tulane Medical School, interned at Charity Hospital and did family practice in Collins until 1957.

Following his residency at the University of Mississippi School of Medicine, Smith practiced anesthesiology at several hospitals throughout the Jackson area.

A recovery from alcoholism prompted his interest in addictionology, a relatively new field. In 1981, following an addictionology preceptorship in Georgia, Smith opened a treatment center at Doctors Hospital. Two years later, he moved to Hattiesburg to help open and direct the Pine Grove Recovery Center, a division of Forrest General Hospital.

Smith and his wife, Ruth, (whom he met at Perk) moved back to Jackson two years ago so that he could become medical director at the Jackson Recovery Center, now owned by their son Preston.

"Disappointment? 'It's really heart-

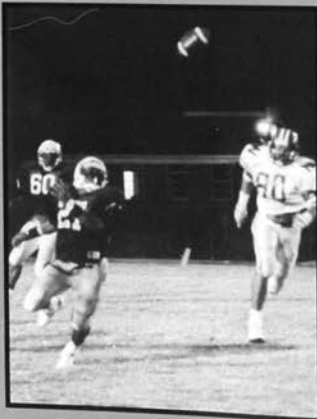
breaking," head coach George Sekul said at season's end.
