

# Into the 90's . . .



#### THE NEW DECADE IN PERSPECTIVE

For the western world, the 19th Century was a Golden Age of magnificent creativity and progress. Standards of living were rising, slavery was abolished, democracy was expanded beautiful poetry was written, enduring music was composed and fundamental new discoveries were made in science. At the turn of the century, it seemed the Golden Age would last forever and the fondest dreams of the visionary idealist would be translated into pragmatic reality

Then an ominous shade of darkening clouds blew over the bright Victorian skies. Prosperity gave way to rain, security to insecurity, stability to instability, and faith in inevitable progress to the doubt of survival. Never had such bright hopes been so ruthlessly shattered.

The final tragedy came on the brutal battlefields of World War I where the best and brightest young men of a generation were slaughtered by the millions. When that long, terrible night of horrible conflict finally ended, thoughtful people were shocked and disillusioned by the barbarism of that war. Modern man came face to face with himself as a stranger; alienated to nature, to God and now to himself. As a result of this tragedy, there rises in the mind the awful vision of the elegance and beauty of the modern civilization as nothing more than a gaudy floral decoration papered over the abyss of human ferocity and greed, according to Henry James.

Thus, World War I looms as the great watershed of the 20th Century and the matrix of the violence, pessimism, totalitarianism and genocide that have characterized our world and our time. For too long we have lived in the terror of a final nuclear war that would consume us all in a fiery holocaust. And then the final epitaph of a species that had named themselves Homo sapiens (intelligent beings) would be that we, and we alone, unlike other victims of extinction, had foolishly and unnecessarily caused our own premature extinction.

Now, as we begin the 10th decade of the 20th Century, there is a ray of genuine hope for the first time since World War I. A small break has appeared in the dark clouds of pessimism and fear. Today humanity stands at a gigantic crossroads in history. Our choice is between death and life. If we continue the blind, aggressive, ethnocentric, senseless behavior of the past, it is only a matter of time before we destroy ourselves. Excitingly, though, there is another choice that leads toward cooperation, prosperity, and life. And all around us there are hopeful new trends and possibilities that need to be cherished and cultivated.

Modern students are becoming more tolerant and more accepting of each other and more receptive to new ideas. Today's students are becoming better informed about current events and more interested in politics. These positive trends among our students are very encouraging because they can lead to better government, a better society, and a better world.

Economically, we are evolving a global economy that can lead to greater opportunity for all and can serve as a logical basis for cooperation among nations. In 1992 the Europeans hope to create a new economic union comparable to the United States and Japan. This European entity could be a model economic cooperation for other regions of the world like Central America, the Middle East, and Southeast Asia.

Another positive trend for the nineties and beyond is that technology with improving means of communication and travel is reducing the whole world to a global village. Soon people will be able to travel to any point on earth in the time required now to drive from the Gulf Coast to New

Orleans, Furthermore, through evolving global networks of communication, all the world's people will share more of the same information and the same art and culture. Most importantly, these new realities of travel and communication will decisively change how people think. It will make the old ethnocentrism of the post forever obsolete and will usher in new apportunities for human sharing and understanding. Then as humans begin to explore and colonize space, their perspectives of thought will be broadened even more, and many of the old conflicts of earth, viewed from the vantage point of spacial immensity and infinity, will appear silly

Other very positive news comes from the recent decline of bloody local wars. The vicious Iran-Iraq War has ended, and the brutal Afghan War has stopped. Of historic significance, the long costly and dangerous Cold War may be winding down to a conclusion. What a giant step that could be in building a more peaceful and secure world! It could also relieve the United States and the world from a terrible economic burden of military spending that has almost bankrupted us all. Maybe then, in the new decade of the nineties, we can find more funds for education, health, cleaning the environment, housing the homeless, and rebuilding our crumbling streets, highways and schools.

We must not allow the new opportunities to build a better and more peaceful world in the nineties to pass by and to fail. The choice is ours, and the responsibility is ours. Our destiny is in our hands. Indeed, this generation has a rendezvous with destiny. To paraphrase John F. Kennedy, if we cannot now end our differences, let us at least make the world safe for diversity. For, in the final analysis. we all inhabit the same planet; we all breathe the same air; we are all mortal, and most of us cherish the future of our children. So the torch is now being passed to you and your generation. It is now your opportunity to reshape America, the world, and yourselves. What will you do with America and the world? History awaits your response. And as you contemplate your future, the words of Berton Braley seem appropriate:

With doubt and dismay you are smitten. You think there's no chance for youth, Son? Why the best books haven't been written; The best race hasn't been won, The best score hasn't been made yet. The best song hasn't been played yet: Cheer up, for the world is young!

Why, the world is just eager for things you ought to create, Its store of true wealth is still meager. its needs are insistent and great.

Don't worry and fret, faint hearted, The chances have just begun. For the best jobs haven't been started, The best work hosn't been done.





Smith holds a B.S. in entomology from Mississippi State University, where he also did some post-graduate work. He graduated from the Tulane Medical School, interned at Charity Hospital and did family practice in Collins until 1957.

Following his residency at the University of Mississippi School of Medicine, Smith practiced anesthesiology at several hospitals throughout the Jackson area.





This, combined with his willingness to support the college in other ways, made Holland an ideal recipient.





Baseball Coach Cooper Farris did not have an easy task to begin on Feb. 25 when his Bulldogs took the plate. It was the first time in 27 years his father wasn't calling the plays.

Former baseball coach Ken Farris retired after last season, leaving in his place the next best thing — his son. Cooper Farris is young, so he hasn't had time to build up the impressive record of this father, the sixth winningest community college baseball coach in the country. The NJCAA Hall of Fame won't be calling anytime soon, either, like they did to his dad recently.

But Cooper is aggressive. He has been recruiting heavily since he came to GCCC in June. He knows he has a lot to live up to, and he intends to do it.

The Perkinston area is not unfamiliar to the younger Farris, who returned home from Victoria, Texas within days of being hired. As a matter of fact, his coaching career began at Stone High in 1977. There, he was named Deep South Coach of the Year in 1983 and '84 and pulled in district championships in 1981, '82, '83 and '84.
