

# Pre-Military Program Lands On Perkinston Campus

The mission of the pre-military program is to recruit, house, feed, instruct, train and counsel a minimum of 36 students at a time. The students to be served are young men and wortne ages 16 to 30, who want to enter the National Guard and meet the criteria for entry but were rejected due to non-qualifying scores on the Armed Services Vocational Aphitude Battery (ASVAB). Students in the program learned life and work skills, received career counseling, creative use of leisure time, physical and leadership skills and teamwork that should enhance their productivity in their future. The goal for pre-military is to establish national model for pre-military development.

The program is funded by JTFA and Jointly coordinated by the State Department of Education: Governor's Office for Literacy and Labor Assistance. Department of Economic and Community Development. The University of Mississippi was active in the implementation of the program.


Weathers said this season has turned out much better than he or head coach Bob Weathers expected when it began. They have played a strong schedule against "top notch competition."


"There's no head-to-head competition," Layton explained. "The highest ranking players determine the winner"
