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MGCCC Drug Free Statement

In compliance with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, as revised by the Drug- Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989, Public Law 101-226, Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College is required to notify employees and students that the unlawful manufacturing, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance or alcohol is prohibited in the college environment. The college has adopted and implemented an educational, assistance, and referral program for students and employees.

Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program will contain:

- Standards of conduct that clearly prohibit the unlawful possession, use or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees on College property or as part of any of its activities.
- A description of the legal sanctions under local, state, or federal law for the unlawful possession, use or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol.
- A description of the health risks associated with the use of illicit drugs and abuse of alcohol.
- A description of any drug or alcohol counseling, treatment, or rehabilitation or reentry programs that are available to students and employees.
- A clear statement that the College will impose disciplinary sanctions on students and employees and a description of those sanctions, up to and including expulsion or termination of employment and referral for prosecution, for violations of the standards of conduct.
- A description of the alcohol and drug education programs provided by the College.

Drug Free Environment Policy for Employees

The rules and regulations governing employees are contained in the policy Drug Free Workplace Statement No. 212.15. This policy is published in the official [MGCCC Policies and Procedures Manual](#).

- A drug-free awareness program will be offered annually to employees of the College to inform employees of:
 - The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - The College's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - Available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs; and
 - The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations occurring in the workplace;
- Employees are required to notify his/her executive officer of any criminal drug conviction occurring in the workplace no later than five days after such conviction.
- †If the employee is employed through a grant, the college will notify the appropriate agency within ten days from receipt of notice.
- †Upon conviction of a criminal drug offense, the executive officer will upon approval of the President:
 - Take appropriate action against the employee up to and including termination, or

- Require the employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by Federal, State, or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency.

Drug Free Environment Policy for Students

The Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College [Student Handbook](#) reflects that students are expected to conform to the code of student conduct described in the "Due Process in *Student Discipline*." Statement No. 717 of the [MGCCC Policies and Procedures Manual](#).

MGCCC students who violate college rules and regulations are subject to disciplinary action. The maximum penalty of dismissal from the college may be imposed on any student who is found guilty of possession, on campus or at a college sponsored activity, of marijuana, alcohol, or any other drug, narcotic, or controlled substance and paraphernalia. Students who have domiciliary status on the residential campus sign a written contract, which explicitly states that, any student who violates major college rules and regulations may be immediately removed from campus housing.

The range of sanctions, which may be imposed for the commission of college offenses, shall include:

- Expulsion from the college/campus
- Suspension from the college for a definite or indefinite period of time.
- Disciplinary probation with or without loss of designated privileges for a definite period of time. The violation of the terms of disciplinary probation may be grounds for suspension or expulsion from the college.
- Loss of such privileges as may be consistent with the offense committed and the rehabilitation of the student.
- Sessions with Licensed Professional Counselor
- Fines
- Warning
- Other sanctions suggested by the Campus Conduct committee

Such other sanctions as may be approved by the committee and consistent with the college's adopted Due Process Procedures.

Tobacco and Vapor Free Environment

Reports from the U.S. Surgeon General typically detail the dangers and health complications associated with smoking and tobacco-use. The College has an obligation to provide a safe and healthy learning and work environment free of smoking and tobacco-use. Students, employees, and visitors have the right to breathe clean air and not be exposed to the effects of smoking and tobacco. All College locations shall be tobacco and vapor free. Smoking in any form, to include but not limited to cigarettes, hookahs, vapor smoking, electronic smoking devices, and the use of tobacco products is prohibited anywhere on the campus; including centers, campus buildings, athletic and recreational facilities, building entrances and common areas, sidewalks, parking lots, college-owned vehicles, and personal vehicles. There are absolutely no exceptions. This policy is published in the official [MGCCC Policies and Procedures Manual](#) Health and Wellness Statement No. 212.33.

Definitions

- Smoking - inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, hookah, or any other lighted or heated tobacco or plant product intended for inhalation, including marijuana, whether natural or synthetic, in any manner or in any form. This also includes the use of electronic smoking devices Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College Policies and Procedures Page 130 which create an aerosol or vapor, in any manner or form, or the use of any oral smoking device for the purpose of circumventing the prohibition of smoking in this Statement.
- Electronic Smoking Device (ESD) – any product containing or delivering nicotine or any other substance intended for human consumption that can be used by a person in any manner for the purpose of inhaling vapor or aerosol from the product. The term includes any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, e-hookah, or vape pen, or under any other product name or descriptor.
- Hookah – water pipe and any associated products and devices which are to produce fumes, smoke, and/or vapor from the burning of material including, but not limited to, tobacco, shisha, or other plant matter.
- Tobacco Product - any product made or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, including any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product (except for raw materials other than tobacco used in manufacturing a component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product).

Promotion and Sale of Tobacco Products

Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College prohibits the promotion and sale of tobacco products: No tobacco-related advertising or sponsorship shall be permitted on College property, at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College sponsored events, or in publications produced by the College, with the exception of advertising in media that is not produced by the College and which is lawfully sold, bought, or distributed on College property. This applies to the use of a tobacco brand or corporate name, trademark, logo, symbol, or motto, selling message, recognizable pattern or colors, or any other indicia of product identical to or similar to, or identifiable with, those used for any brand of Cigarettes, including ESDs, cigars, pipes, including hookah pipes, shall not be sold or distributed as samples on College grounds, either in vending machines or any area on College property.

Policy Enforcement

Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College Policies and Procedures Page 131 The College also aims to maintain a tobacco and vapor free environment through education, awareness, and a spirit of cooperation. Employees in violation of the policy could face disciplinary action applicable to Statement 212.4.1 (Progressive Discipline). Student violators could face disciplinary actions and monetary fines applicable to Statement 717 (Due Process in Student Discipline).

Substance Testing for Nursing and Allied Health Programs

Nursing students and Allied Health students at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College (MGCCC) are strictly prohibited from manufacturing, using, possessing, selling, conveying or distributing any illegal drug or controlled substance in any amount in any manner in the college environment or at a college sponsored/related activity. Additionally, Nursing students and Allied Health students are prohibited from using any legal drug in a non-prescribed, irresponsible or illegal manner. Use of any substance to the extent that it impairs mental acuity or physical dexterity is strictly prohibited, especially in the classroom, lab, and clinical settings even if the student has a prescription for the substance. The Nursing and Allied Health Programs have a zero tolerance of illegal substance use/abuse and misuse of legal substances. This policy is published in the official [MGCCC Policies and Procedures Manual](#) Statement No. 725.

MGCCC Athletic Department Drug Testing Procedure

It is the goal of the Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College Athletic Department to run a drug free athletic program. It is our position that a drug free program is to the benefit of the college, the community, and especially each of the athletes contributing to the success of our athletic program.

As a means toward this end and in consideration of the College allowing the undersigned student to participate in the college's athletic program(s), the College Athletic Department will conduct drug tests as a part of the pre-season and will conduct unannounced drug testing on all athletes involved with varsity athletics at MGCCC. Zero Tolerance for minors (under 21) 63-11-30 (3)

This subsection shall be known and may be cited as Zero Tolerance for Minors. The provisions of this subsection shall apply only when a person under the age of twenty-one (21) years has a blood alcohol concentration of two one-hundredths percent (.02%) or more, but lower than eight one-hundredths percent (.08%). If the person's blood alcohol concentration is eight one-hundredths percent (.08%) or more, the provisions of subsection (2) shall apply.

*The minimum sentence for a violation after two or more prior convictions for a felony drug offense have become final is a mandatory term of life imprisonment without release and a fine up to \$20 million if an individual and \$75 million if other than an individual.

Types of Drugs, Their Common Names and Potential Health Risks

Drugs are chemical substances affecting both the mind and body. The use of any drug may affect an unborn child. The prolonged use of any drug may lead to physical and/or psychological dependence. An overdose of any drug may lead to death. The following list includes the various kinds of drugs, common names of drugs, and descriptions of the possible health risks. This list is not extensive, and other risks may be involved.

Alcohol/beer, wine, wine coolers, liquor (1-12 hours effect)	Causes depression, aggression, slurred speech, muscular incoordination. Frequent use can lead to cirrhosis of liver, pancreatitis, brain disorders, vitamin deficiencies & malnutrition. Can lead to coma or death in large quantities.	Puffiness of face, redness of eyes, depression, disorientation, shallow respiration, nausea, cold and clammy skin, dehydration. Slurred speech. Impairs muscle coordination, memory and judgement.
Marijuana/pot, reefer, grass, THC hash, hash oil, herb, cannabis (2-4 hours effect)	Can impair memory perception and judgement by destroying brain cells. Raises blood pressure. Contains more known carcinogens (poisons) than cigarettes.	Euphoria, relaxed inhibitions, disoriented behavior, staring off into space, hilarity without cause. Time distortion. Bloodshot eyes, dry mouth & throat, increased appetite. Fatigue, hallucinations, depression.

Tips for Prevention:

1. Connect With Your Friends and Avoid Negative Peer Pressure: Pay attention to who you are hanging out with . If you are hanging out with a group in which the majority of kids are drinking alcohol or using drugs to get high, you may want to think about making some new friends . You may be headed toward an alcohol and drug problem if you continue to hang around others who routinely drink alcohol, smoke marijuana, abuse prescription drugs or use illegal drugs. You don't have to go along to get along .

2. Enjoy Life and Do What You Love - Don't Add Alcohol and Drugs: Learn how to enjoy life and the people in your life, without adding alcohol or drugs. Alcohol and drugs can change who you are, limit your potential and complicate your life. Too often, "I'm bored" is just an excuse . Get out and get active in school and community activities such as music, sports, arts or a part-time job. Giving back as a volunteer is a great way to gain perspective on life.

3. Get Educated About Alcohol and Drugs: You cannot rely on the myths and misconceptions that are out there among your friends and on the internet . Your ability to make the right decisions includes getting educated . Visit [Learn About Alcohol](#) and [Learn About Drugs](#) . And, as you learn, share what you are learning with your friends and your family .

4. Plan Ahead: As you make plans for the party or going out with friends you need to plan ahead. You need to protect yourself and be smart. Don't become a victim of someone else's alcohol or drug use. Make sure that there is someone you can call, day or night, no matter what, if you need them. And do the same for your friends.

5. Get Help: If you or someone you know is in trouble with alcohol or drugs, get help. Don't wait. You don't have to be alone.

MGCCC Assistance

Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College cares about the health and well-being of its students and employees. Counselors are available to help students with the difficulties that are often confronted in the normal process of growing and developing.

If students at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College have problems, crises, or needs for help that are beyond the scope of counseling and require more intensive clinical intervention than is available through campus counseling, counselors will actively assist students in arranging for services with outside agencies or private practitioners.
