The President's perspective on making a positive difference in people's lives

Twillis H. Lost began serving as the 11th chief executive officer and footney resident of Massissopi Guif Coast Community College on Aug. 1, 1998. The first five years of his administration have been marked with significant caroliment growth, ambitious campus improvements, more technology programs and unprecedented cuts in direct stalle funding.

OUESTION How has the college changed during the five years you've been president?


LOTT: I believe the Strategic Plan 2000 is the critical change element of the last five years. It has changed us as an institution because it has given us a focus: a mission, a vision, 10 strategic initiatives, and a master plan for each campus and center. It gave us our core values as well. These core values are what we base our decisions on. I see all of that together as making us a stronger institution.

It has also enabled us to send a great message to the people we are trying to serve; we are here to make a positive difference in your lives. Give us that opportunity.

We also had a SACS accreditation visit and that had a lot to do with our change. We had to respond to 31 recommendations and the visiting team's observation that we were operating as three separate colleges in many instances. Because of that experience, I think we are much closer as an institution to being one college, working together with a single focus.

Otto THIN Since fall 2000, full-time credit enrollment has increased 32 percent and total enrollment is up 19 percent. Is there any up-side to that situation when you are faced with serving more students with less state or local dollars?

LOTT: It has been difficult with money to tight. The up-side in that we became a more efficient institution by eliminating expenses in many different areas. Having an increase in windent expenses has caused us to become more focused on what expenditures were necessary to operate.



OUESTION. What do you perceive as the most challenging issue that is facing MGCCC today?

LOTT: Number one is completion of the master plans for our campuses and centers. Our facilities and infrastructure must be able to accommodate the enrollment growth that we are going to be experiencing in the next five to 10 years. If we are not able to complete the master plan, we may have to limit enrollment at sites.

The second most critical issue is making sure that we remain affordable and accessible to the people. Without us, many people don't have any hope to improve their lives.

QUESTION. We often hear that education is the single most important tool in economic development. How does the community college function in that tole?

LOTT: The economic impact for students is unbelievable. Last year, Mississapic community colleges participated in a national economic impact students. The results showed that students receive a 28 percent return on their investment in higher education. More studies say that 85 to 90 percent of all jobs of the future are going to require at least an associate'y degree. We are a major player in that regard.

There are 72,000 people in our four counties who do not have a high-school diploma. We are the major provider of Adult Basic Skills and GFD programs.

We are also working with businesses and industries, trying to keep their employees at world-class level of training so that they can be competitive in a global marketplace.

ODESTION: How do you answer the critics that say the community college is the last choice or the second choice behind the universities?

LOTT: I believe that community college are the people's college. We have an eyen door. If you really look at it, we are the piet choice for the majority of higher education students. More than 70 percent of all freshmen college students in Mississippi attend community colleges.

OUENTION. What is the contributes of the individual employee, and why is it so important to the mission of the college?

LOTE: I have tried to make sure that everyone at the college knows how important what they do is to the mission of the college. All employees participated in The MCCAE. Experience, our customer service minimum and I believe that program has a tremendous impact. The employees are the backbone of the college, and we all work together to make the experience of amenda (1997).



MGCCC celebrates enrollment achievements

veryone working at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College knew a challenge was shead when goals were set for the fall 2003 semester to enroll 10,000 credit students. The goal was high, and the college began working to achieve the largest growth spurt in the institution's history.

Although the challenge seemed tough, the college's strategy was successful when every employee took an attitude of personal ownership for student recruitment. Realizing that each contact with a prospective student is vitally important, Gulf Coast President Wills Lott encouraged faculty and staff at all levels to make a positive impression for the college.

Administrators, faculty and staff took a unified initiative to invite as many people as possible to come see

how an education at Gulf Coast could improve their lives.

"I don't think you can say that just one thing helped. There are many pieces to the puzzle that have been a positive influence on our circolliment," Lott said. In 2000, he met with employees at every campus and center. Surprisingly, most employees thought circolliment had been growing each year. The reality was that enrollment had been flat for the past 10 years.

"From that, all our employees became recruiters. They also started putting more emphasis on retention of students trying to keep students here, trying to make a difference in their lives, and trying to get them through their degree programs. We also recognized our recruitment effort." Lott said.

Enrollment began to climb. In fall 2001, enrollment was up 4.4 percent; in fall 2002, it was up 5.5 percent.

Other factors also influenced growth, Lott said, including a sluggish economy (fewer jobs), the addition of new programs in information-technology fields, the opening of the Mississippi Virtual Community College and an aggressive marketing campaign.

This new advertising campaign was launched in June 2003 by the college's Institutional Relations staff and targeted prospects in Jackson, George, Stone and Harrison counties. Recent high-school graduates and women in their 30s and 40s were specifically-targeted dependence of the property of the proper

"Focus-group research revealed that the decision to go to college was an emotional one," said College Hartfield, vice president for Institutional Relations. "Our theme "Picture This..." invited prospective students of all ages to picture a better job, a better life, with a benefit of a college edication."

Hartfield said the college also had to recognize that there were more newcomers in the coastal area; therefore, a more aggressive marketing campaign was necessary to raise awareness of the

"We have a 92-year history, but we can't assume that people in the local area know about the college, its affordability, flexible schedules and convenient locations. We have a responsibility to engage as many people as possible in higher education so that they can improve their lives; "she said.

The college adopted a new logo as an advertising brand identity, but response to the new graphic was so positive, that Gulf Coast officials decided it would be a better permanent logo for the college. The logo had been through a creative process to be developed, and students and employees gave feedback about the design through a survey conducted in May 2003.

The college implemented a tollfree phone number so prospective students would have one simple way of contacting the college and finding information. College advertisements also promoted the college website.

Employees working with students during registration prepared for some growing pains as the college accommodated additional students with extra course sections and many new adjunct instructors.

At the sixth-week count, the official number of enrollment for fall 2003 semester was 10,231 students -- an 8.4 percent increase compared to the previous year.

Her success as a non-traditional student was recognized in summer 2003, when Acklin received the

Southern Region Student of the Year Award from the Mississippi Association of Adult and Community Education. In her first two semesters at Guff Coast, this mother of twins has earned a 3.5 GPA while maintaining a full time poh and being a substitute teacher. Acklin is the first Guff Coast student to earn the Student of the Year from the MACE.

Acklin says the busy day is worth it. "h's all about desire. If it's important to you, you will find a way to make it happen. Sure, my day is full. I don't take classes after 2 p.m., so I can get the kids home safely from school. I take night classes after the bus route, but it's important to me and my family. My education is a gift to myself."

The only real way to appreciate Acklin's academic success is to drive back into her past. In the ninth grade, she was taken out of school by her parents to help raise her 10 brothers and sisters. At 16, she got her first job on the docks in Bliosts as a shrimp packer and never returned to

high achool. Over the course of the next 30 years, Acklin can best be described as a "Jill of all." Trades. "She worked a wide variety of jobs arous the South, ranging from a cashier to a collisional appraises. Steady comployment and a need to work kept her from guing back to school.

But all that changed in 1994 when Acidin and her hurshand. Charlie, brought home two new priorities from the hospital – their twins Marshall and Mary. 
