As students and employees at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, you know how vital it is that we provide facilities and services to meet your needs, as well as our surrounding communities' needs. As our enrollment grows—the college reached the over-11,000-student benchmark in fall 2004—so do your needs. This is the fourth-straight fall semester that enrollment has increased at Gulf Coast (the state's largest community college), and we anticipate even more record growths.

More students are choosing the community college because it offers an affordable higher-education option and the convenience of multiple locations, on-

line courses and flexible schedules. Our response to growth must also be organized, cost-efficient and pleasing to the eye.

As we prepared the Strategic Plan 2010, we made adjustments to Campus Master Plans. With our mission and vision in mind, we are looking ahead and anticipating what our college needs to be and what it must do in the next 10-15 years.

We hope you treasure this yearbook for years to come. Gulf Coast is different by design—in our programs, our services, our locations, our community relations. We are the people's college, and we certainly hope we have made a positive difference in your life during your time here.

Good luck and hope you feel better soon." The concern of these students continued to amaze me and helped me realize that I had made a positive difference in their lives.

I want all of you to know how grateful I am to know you. You have been there for me throughout this stressful time of my life. Words can never express how thankful I am for everything you have done for me. Special thanks goes to Renita Thomason, who made the yearbook happen. She continued the process in my absence and made this year's book of memories a reality.

MGCC is not only a magnificent school at which to receive an education, but also an amazing place to work and 'Make a Positive Difference in People's Lives Every Day.'

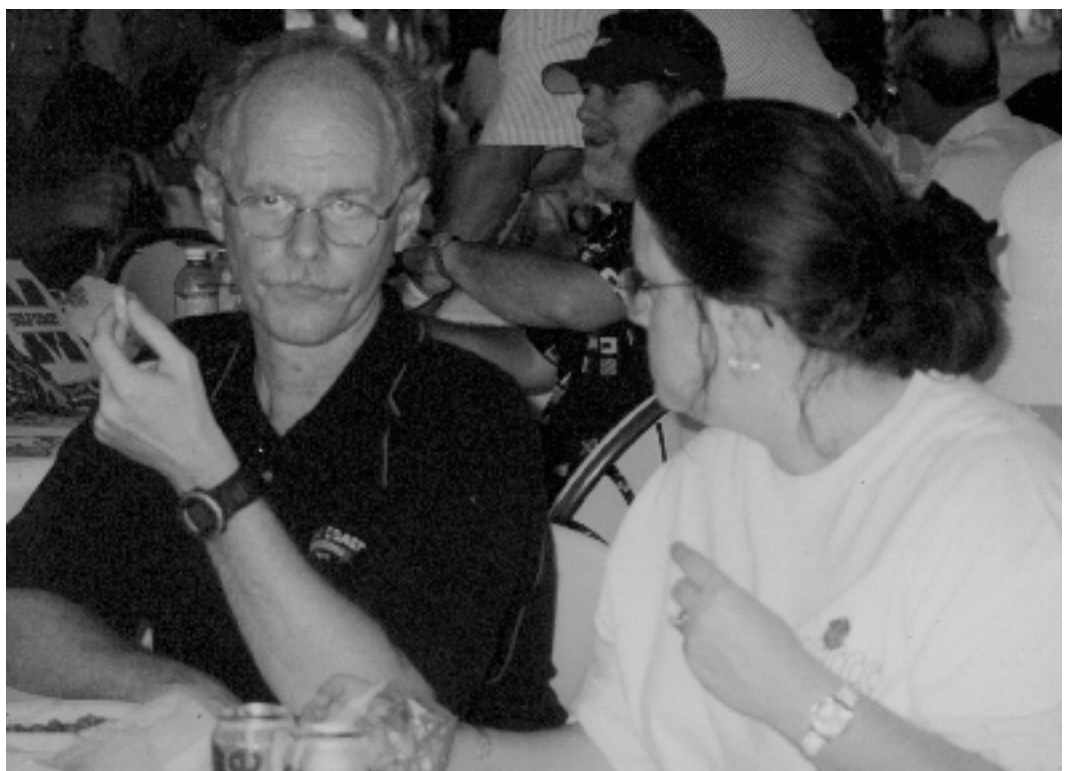
One more thing – the West Harrison County Center in Long Beach and the Keesler Center in Biloxi fall under the auspices of the JD Campus. That means more service to more people.

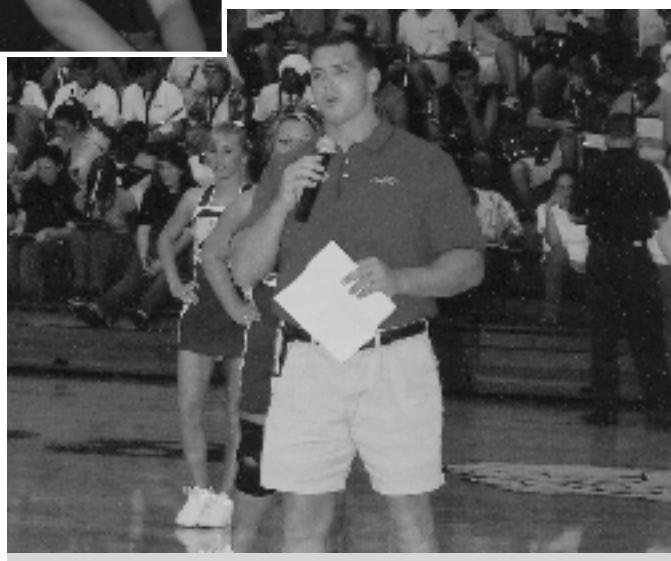
Meet the Teams attracts Bulldog fans

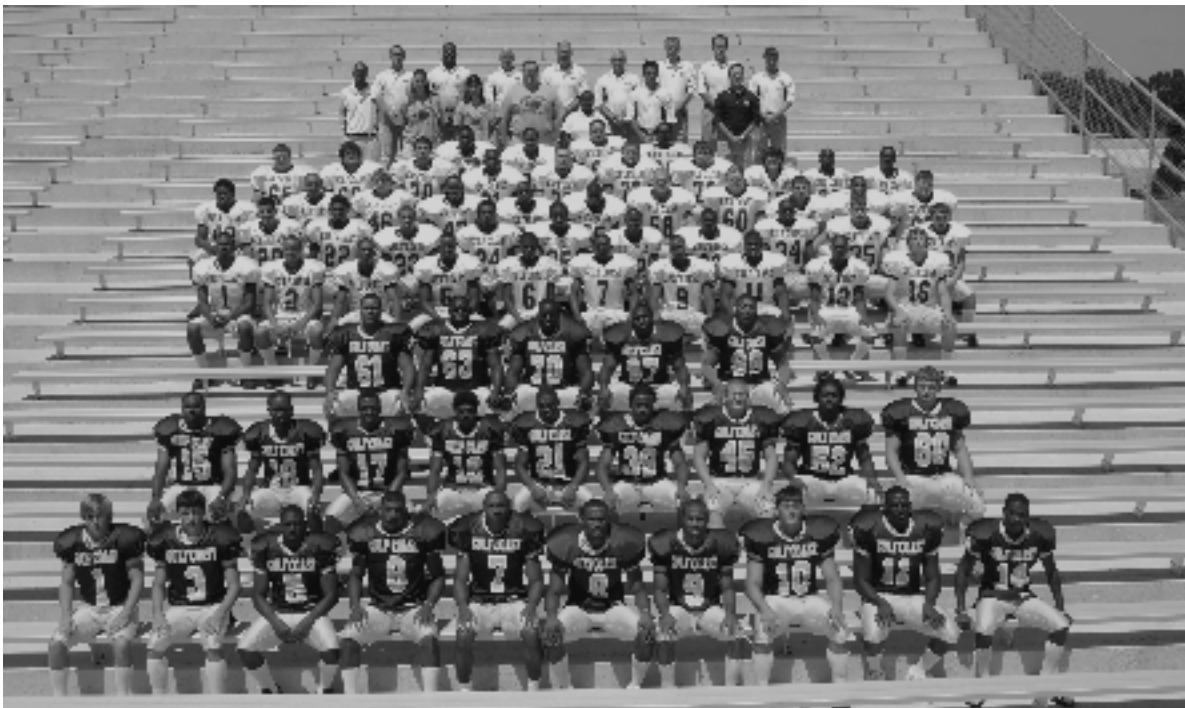

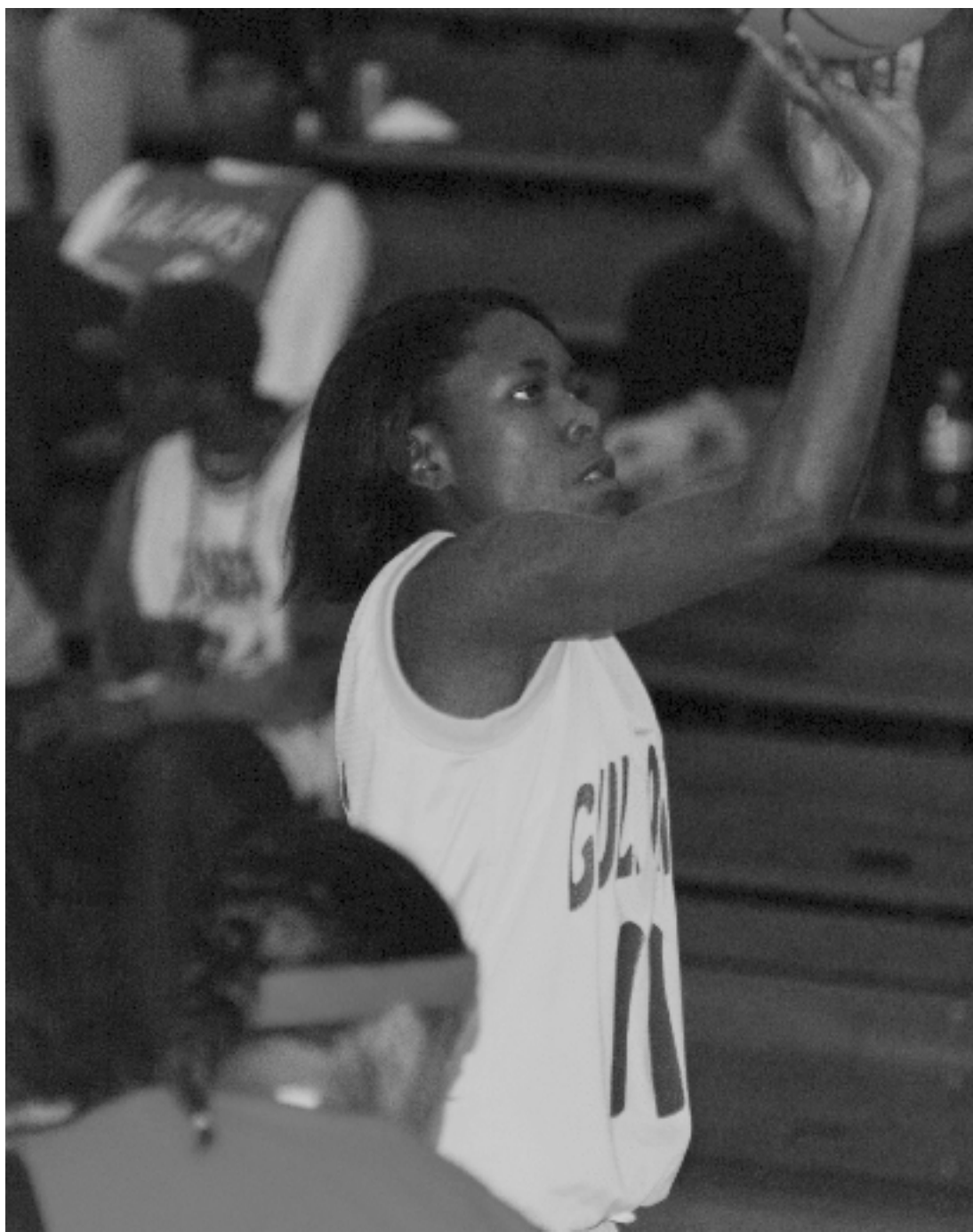
BULLDOG Men's Basketball

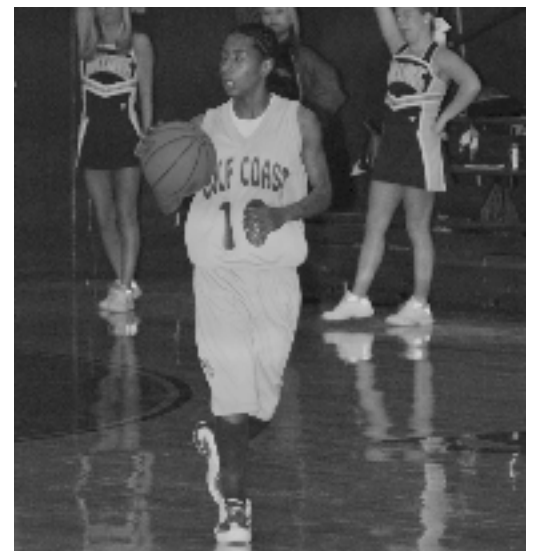
BULLDOG Women's Basketball

Vision

Building today,
preparing for tomorrow

In September 2004, Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College received some exciting and challenging news in the form of the MGCCC Facility Needs Assessment & Recommendations report delivered by Dr. Ed Hartsell, educational consultant and former president of Pensacola Junior College.

We've renamed that report "Building Today, Preparing for Tomorrow" for this simple reason: We have a shared vision for this college that involves many stakeholders in the college's future. Among those are current and future students, our local communities, alumni, employees, and the myriad of people who have a connection to our college because they value its mission.

"Since Strategic Plan 2000, our growth has been rapid and our progress significant," said Dr. Willis Lott, MGCCC president. "Like growing towns and cities, college campuses must be prepared to handle growing populations and increased demands for services and space. Our response to growth must also be organized, cost-efficient and pleasing to the eye."

Hartsell has recommended \$97.5 million in capital-improvement projects. He said, "Local economic and population data demonstrate sustained growth along the Mississippi Gulf Coast. This economic vitality, coupled with the dramatic growth of your college enrollment, shows that you have a dynamic institution. Unfortunately, this dramatic growth may soon begin to tax the capacity of the campuses and centers to respond adequately to the needs of the service district."

These capital improvements are expected to equip the college for sustained growth during the next 10-15 years. Dr. Clyde Strickland, chair of the MGCCC Board of Trustees, said, "We are considering all types of funding – federal and private-sector grants, local and state capital-budget support, a capital campaign through the MGCCC Foundation and low-interest loans. All sources of revenue will be carefully deliberated."

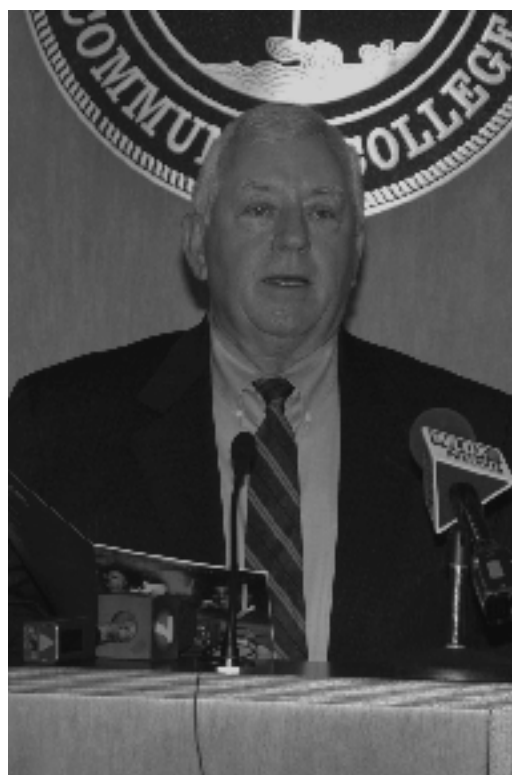

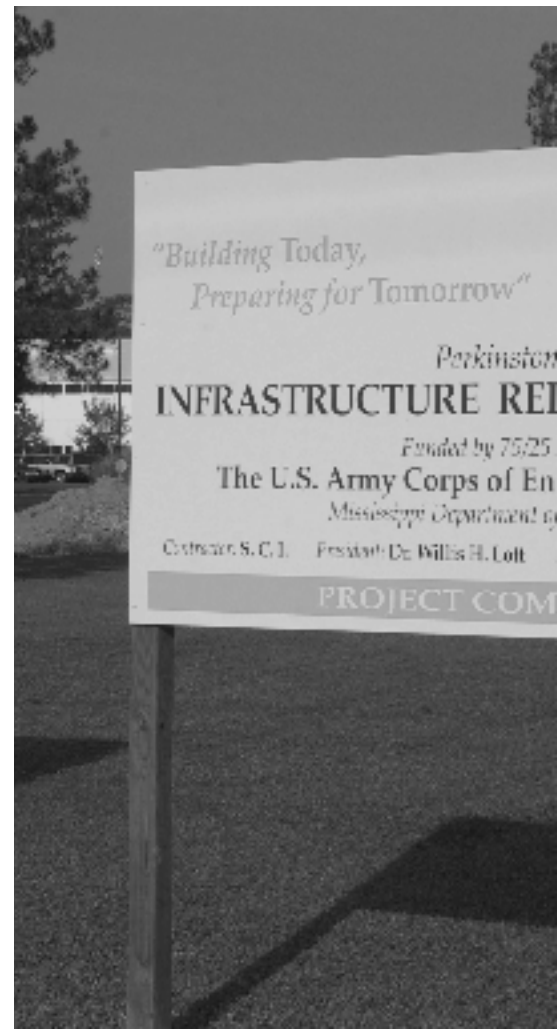

Gulf Coast's oldest campus gets a facelift above and below the surface

On Aug. 23, 2004, while students filed into overcrowded dorms and the Perkinston Campus posted the college's largest gain in fall enrollment, Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers were inking an agreement to fund a \$2.5 million infrastructure improvement project at the college's oldest location, the Perkinston Campus.

Gulf Coast President Dr. Willis Lott said, "While the replacement of water supply, sewage and storm-drainage systems can't compare with the glamour of a new \$3.5 million residence hall, these infrastructure improvements are absolutely necessary to the safety and convenience of our students and to the future growth of this campus."

Lack of funds for the infrastructure project has been a major roadblock in the implementation of the Perkinston Campus Master Plan. The \$2.5 million grant, which is being matched with 25 percent local funds, has caused quite a stir -- literally. The constant roar of heavy equipment, along with dirt and dust of torn-up roads, sidewalks and green space, had students, employees and visitors navigating alternate routes to classes, offices and even events on a daily basis this past year.

"It's not a pretty process, but it's an important step in preparing this campus for the future," said Dr. Mary Graham, Perkinston Campus vice president.

After the infrastructure project is complete, the college can proceed with new roadways, parking, landscaping, lighting and construction projects, which will add more classroom and residence-hall space.



Year in Review

Giving you a glimpse of what happened in the last half of 2004 and the first half of 2005.

The Explosion of Excellence scholarship program expanded into Stone County in spring 2004.

In spring 2004, Dr. Cheryl Thompson-Stacy, vice president for Academic and Student Affairs, received the Exemplary Leadership Award from the Chair Academy.

An estimated crowd of almost 7,000 family and friends turned out to recognize one of Gulf Coast's largest graduating classes on May 12, 2004. More than 1,400 students made up the class, with 655 students taking part in the commencement ceremony at the Coast Coliseum.

The signing of a new agreement between Gulf Coast and the University of South Alabama only took a moment, but the benefits will last a lifetime for students. Gulf Coast President Dr. Willis Lott and USA President Gordon Moulton made the new articulation agreement official during a signing ceremony on June 9, 2004. This agreement provides a detailed path of classes for Gulf Coast students to follow when transferring into one of 52 degree programs offered at USA.

Below: For the third straight year, Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College has been ranked as one the nation's top 100 community colleges. Gulf Coast earned an overall

ranking of No. 91 in the June 24, 2004, issue of Community College Week, a leading educational magazine for the country's 1,200 community colleges. Gulf Coast is the only community college in the states of Mississippi, Alabama or Louisiana to make that year's overall top 100 list.

The Jefferson Davis Campus collected 400 pints of blood during the 2003-2004 school year. The local chapter of the American Red Cross recognized the students and staff members for their giving spirit at its annual meeting on July 13, 2004.

The college's information-technology programs received a National Science Foundation grant for \$599,997 in summer 2004. The grant's goal is to increase both the number and quality of students successfully completing technology programs, with a special emphasis on female students and other under-represented groups.

In fall 2004, Gulf Coast and the Knight Foundation made an immediate life-changing difference for two dozen Harrison County residents through the Dream of Prosperity. The aim of the project is to provide 20-25 residents with the financial assistance and support that will allow them to successfully train for a career through the college and help their families become financially self-sufficient. This project was organized by the college and is being funded through a \$305,000 grant from the Knight Foundation's Community Partnership Program.

The annual Backyard Barbecue at Liaison on Sept. 2, 2004, drew a crowd of nearly 600 people. At the event, the college celebrated another record enrollment. A two-tiered cake, banner and floating 48-inch balloons boasted of the college's 11,000 students.

The Showcase Golf Tournament, held on Sept. 18, 2004, at the Wiggins Pine Burr Country Club raised \$12,000 for student scholarships. Over the last 15 years, the tournament has earned more than \$162,000 to help deserving students achieve their educational goals at Gulf Coast.

The Smithsonian's exhibit "Key Ingredients: America by Food" was on exhibition at the JC Campus during October/November 2004. The exhibit uses artifacts, photographs and illustrations to examine the evolution of the American kitchen and food industries.

In November 2004, the college began Phase III of the MGCCC Experience, a college-wide customer-service initiative first introduced in 2001.

Three Gulf Coast instructors – Kenny Myrick, music instructor at the Perkinston Campus; Terry Pollard, English instructor at the Jefferson Davis Campus; and Dr. MaryAnn Sison, history instructor at the Jackson County Campus – received the 2004 Humanities Teacher Award. Each October, the Mississippi Humanities Council (MHC) honors instructors in the fields of English, history, music,

Honoring a President

Dr. J.J. Hayden Jr.



Our college family was saddened by the Oct. 10, 2004, death of Dr. Julius John "J.J." Hayden Jr., the ninth president of our institution. Hayden was a man of great vision, and we owe our present-day status as Mississippi's largest community college to his creative thinking and influential leadership.

During his 35-year career, the college's campuses and centers grew from one to seven, and enrollment increased nearly tenfold. He was an extraordinary man who embodied the open-door mission of community colleges. At the age of 33, he became the institution's youngest chief executive officer. He also holds the distinction of being the longest-serving president (32 years, 1953-1986). It was his dream and his achievement to transform the institution, which grew from a rural agricultural high school in 1911 to a multi-faceted junior college leading Mississippi's transition from agriculture to industry.

Hayden's last trip to campus was in September 2004, when he and his wife, Lillian, sought shelter from Hurricane Ivan and stayed in Andrews Hall. Mrs. Hayden said, "J.J. was so happy to be home."

On Oct. 19, 2004, the college hosted a special memorial service for Hayden in the Gregory War Memorial Chapel on the Perkinston Campus. Charles Sullivan, college archivist, prepared a pictorial tribute booklet commemorating Hayden's service to the college. The book was presented to Mrs. Hayden and their children -- Dr. Julius John "Jay" Hayden III, Glover R. Hayden and Dr. Susie S. Hayden-Cruse.

Dr. Willis Lott, the current and 11th president of the institution, said, "Throughout his presidency, and, indeed, his lifetime, Dr. Hayden was steadfast in his ambition and purpose -- to bring higher education to the people of South Mississippi."
