

Mississippi Bowl

In this dogfight, one group of Bulldogs barked, while the other pack of Bulldogs had plenty of bite. No. 7 Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College played like a title contender in a 41-7 pasting of No. 3 Georgia Military College (GMC) at the first-ever Mississippi Bowl held December 7 at Biloxi Indian Stadium in front of an estimated crowd of 5,000. The 2008 Bulldog sophomore class finished at Gulf Coast with a 22-2 overall record, a 2007 NJCAA co-national title, two MACJC state championships and two MACJC South Division crowns. Gulf Coast finished the 2008 season with 440 points, which ties the record for most points in college history set by last year's squad. Gulf Coast head coach Steve Campbell (top center), whose five-year record at Gulf Coast stands at 41-11, summed up Mississippi Bowl game day for his team: "Anytime you can beat the No. 3 team in the nation 41-7, that's pretty good."





Highlights at the first-ever Mississippi Bowl weren't just on the field. On Saturday, December 6, players from both teams took time out from the busy bowl schedule to spend time with local children at two Boys and Girls Club locations on the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

While Georgia Military had its walk-through at Biloxi Indian Stadium, Gulf Coast players and coaches visited the Biloxi Boys and Girls Club at its Lamuese Street location. During the afternoon, Georgia Military made a stop at the D'Iberville Boys and Girls Club.

The kids took part with team members in activities like kickball, touch football and basketball. The Gulf Coast cheerleaders even whipped up a game of duck-duck goose with some of the smaller children.





Amy Hunt
2008 Instructor of the Year

As a high-school and college athlete, eating right and staying in shape came naturally to Amy Hunt. She majored in nutrition and dietetics at The University of Southern Mississippi...and that's when her healthy obsession took over.

"I was on my way to being a registered dietician," Hunt says. "But I realized in college that I didn't just want to be working in a hospital or cafeteria somewhere. My views on health and behavior modifications were broader, so I changed my major to include all health aspects, and not just nutrition."


Two master's degrees and seven years later, Hunt's an expert on anything that goes into your body, and on any way to exercise it out. She's on a personal crusade to make sure people live longer, healthier lives

"When I first decided on this as a career, my main goal was to try and change the perception of physical education," she says. "It encompasses

all of our sciences: nutrition, anatomy, physiology and biology. It's more important to me that my students learn things that they can apply in their own lives. College students can be a tough audience when it comes to health promotion. But I've witnessed permanent behavior change in many students. All of their success is outstanding. They're the reason I love what I do."

Dr. Wayne "W.T." Taylor, physical education instructor at the Jackson County Campus describes Hunt as "a positive influence to students, faculty and staff at JC. Since becoming chairperson three years ago, we have seen our facility and department turn from a nice, quiet place to be to a vibrant, loud, exciting place to be."

To Hunt, it's all in a day's work. It's her choice to make that all-important difference...and that's what she conveys to her students. "I try to empower my students and tell them that they are in charge of making choices. They have the power to change."



William Martin2008 Difference Maket

In 42 years on the job, William Martin saw and heard it all at the Jackson County Campus. But even after working all those years, he felt that the more things changed, the more they stayed the same... like focusing on customer service and keeping his professional attitude despite the ever-changing world around him.

"If we talk to students and treat them like adults, then they will respond like adults," said Martin before his retirement as dean of Instruction in 2008. He also suggested that knowing where to send students for help and remembering to always be friendly with them were vital to maintaining a positive relationship with students.

Raymond Tanner, Jackson County Campus math department chair, says, "William made decisions based on what he thought was best for the college, and not what was best for him. "He always weighed every possible outcome and made the selection that was best for all."

After graduating from Perkinston Junior College in 1962 with an associate's degree in drafting and design, it seemed architecture would

be Martin's calling. However, after receiving three degrees, all related to education, a career at Gulf Coast became the perfect fit. He taught drafting and design (1966-69) at the Jackson County Campus; worked as assistant dean of Vocational-Technical Instruction (1969-78) and academic dean (1978-97); and was dean in Instruction from 1998 until his retirement.

"Mr. Martin provided help and guidance to dozens of department chairs on about every subject you can think of," says Dr. James Dunn, science department chair at the campus. "He went about this with no fanfare and just did what needed to be done."

Cecilia Frisbie, Developmental Studies chair at the campus, says, "Any person who devotes his career to an organization and educational institution for more than 40 years personifies dedication, loyalty and integrity. We respect and appreciate his tireless efforts to help make Gulf Coast a place where a positive difference is made each day."



The late Alfred F. Dantzler Jr. and Vallie Hughes Dantzler would have been proud of the brandnew, 32-foot Bell Tower and Carillon named in their honor. Thanks to a \$200,000 donation from the Danztler family, the structure is a new centerpiece to the campus mall area. (The Dantzler family also donated 160 acres of land during the formation of the Perkinston Campus nearly 100 years ago.) In addition to the clock, the tower has speakers near the top that can be used as a public-address system to broadcast important information across campus. The carillon will also chime on the hour. The tower and surrounding concrete area has been deemed a smoke-free area. Accompanying the tower is a permanent plaque that bears the names of the donors.

Sandra Murphy 2008 Instructor of the Year

Ask Sandra Murphy to narrow down her list of outstanding classroom experiences as an Associate Degree Nursing instructor, and she just can't do it – she has so many of them, it's too difficult to name just one. For her, the greatest experience (and the biggest reward) comes when she meets up with past students. When they tell her about their careers and the exciting things going on in their lives, she can't help but think of how she played a small part in making that nurse what he or she is today. For Murphy, a 10-year employee with the college, "There is nothing more outstanding than that. That classroom and those students are my motivation for everything," she says. "If we have open communication and a lot of dialogue, we can all learn from each other. The whole thing is cyclical: I teach them, and they'll teach others."

Murphy has served as the curriculum coordinator for the ADN department's second-year team and as a department chairperson.

In 2007, she was nominated for the prestigious Nightingale Award, an honor that goes to the state's top nursing educator of the year, as decided by the Mississippi Nurses Association.

Selena Wilkerson, a 2006 Gulf Coast graduate, says compassion is also an element Murphy, a.k.a. "Murph," instilled in her everyday life. "In my area of nursing, compassion is needed every day," she says. "Compassion is not only needed by the patients, but also the families. There is not a day that goes by that I don't hear Murph in my head telling me to never lose the compassion that's needed to be a great nurse."

"When Dr. Lott called, my heart began racing, and my thoughts were, 'Uh-oh, I have really made a big boo-boo.' I was very surprised and in shock. I did not know what to say but thank you." Such was the reaction of Gloria Smith to Lott's call about her winning the Difference Maker Award. But it really shouldn't have been a surprise: her life has been one of service – to her family, her faith, her students and her country.

Smith began her career at the campus as the instructor for the teacher assistant program in January 2002. Prior to that, she had served kindergarten and elementary students in Coast public schools for more than 12 years.

The Huntsville, Alabama, native and Gulf Coast alumna moved to the Coast in 1973, graduated from Gulfport East and enlisted in the Army for three years. From February 2003 to March 2004, she was called to serve in Iraq. Upon her return to the states and to the Jefferson Davis Campus, she became a Special Populations coordinator and has served ADA students and those enrolled through the Dream of Prosperity program, among others.

Elaine Davis, Special Projects counselor at the Jefferson Davis Campus, says, "Gloria embodies the concept of service and provides inspiring leadership through her service to others. She demonstrates an incredible work ethic and 'can-do!' spirit every day, and she truly makes a positive difference in the lives of others every day."

"I wouldn't have received this recognition if it had not been for the people I work with daily," Smith adds. "I am only a small piece of a large puzzle in Student Services, the Career Center, Financial Aid and Admissions. It is great to be a part of this team."

Ten years of teaching has taught Kathy Dedeaux that not everyone comes into a math class with a confidence level worth bragging about. Let's face it, math scares a lot of folks. That's when Dedeaux comes to the rescue.

"It's my job as their instructor to help students overcome anxieties toward mathematics and to help them achieve their educational goals," says Dedeaux, a 1988 Gulf Coast graduate. "Students in my classroom feel safe to explore and question during their discovery of new mathematical concepts. I believe security is established through my consistent classroom environment."

So how do you keep math interesting? "I try to teach it to the students as if it were a game," she says. "You get all the pieces together, which are made up of what you've learned in the past. Then you pull from that knowledge and put all the pieces together."

Fellow mathematics instructor Jason Ross says, "Ms. Dedeaux has always made her department feel as though they work with her rather than for her. She is a terrific leader, because she leads by example. She often uses the term 'team' when referring to our department, and I think that's a good analogy of her leadership style - she considers us all important parts of the team, and all of us are necessary to be successful."

Jason Rouchon's official title is assistant superintendent of Buildings and Grounds. In other words, if there's a hole to dig, a trash can to be replaced or an air-conditioning unit to be fixed on the Perkinston Campus, he's on the job. As he puts it, "It drives me more every day that if you work hard and stay focused, good things will happen."

Rouchon, a Gulf Coast alumnus, is the first to say he's not the only one making the campus what it is, inside and out. That's why he shares the Difference Maker honor with his staff. "Co-workers are what it's all about," he says. "If you have a good team, you can make a difference in everything you do. They are the ones who help me make a difference with every day."

Alumni Officer Brenda Donahoe says, "Jason makes a difference for someone, somewhere, every day at Perk. It never ceases to amaze me how something that I think is such a big problem is faced with, 'Don't worry, it's no big deal. We can handle it.' And he doesn't ask his crew

to do anything he wouldn't do."

"It makes me feel good that people think I make a difference," Rouchon concludes.







During the Gulf Coast Bulldogs' 2008 season, David Dueitt, director of the Band of Gold, and more than 200 band members dazzled halftime audiences at home football games with music called "Oz Unleashed" featuring music from the shows "The Wizard of Oz," "The Wiz" and "Wicked."







An unequaled demand for each student's best performance was the hallmark of Dueitt's career. His open-door policy and concern for his students were cornerstones on which he built his award-winning music program. In 1996, the college recognized him for his dedication by awarding him the Perkinston Campus Instructor of the Year award.

At the Perkinston Campus, Dueitt established a basketball Pep Band, two concert bands and numerous ensemble musical groups. A conductor's program for college students who want to be professional conductors, music directors or band directors was also added to his repertoire of classes. Under his tutelage, students in the program were offered the opportunity to study and practice the art of conducting at the college level. In 1998, he took music education a step further by creating the Gold Medal Classic Marching Festival, a contest for high-school bands.








No. 7 Gulf Coast played like a title contender in a 41-7 pounding of No. 3 Georgia Military College at the first-ever Mississippi Bowl December 7 at Biloxi Indian Stadium in front of an estimated crowd of 5,000. The Bulldog defense held GMC to 57 yards of offense in the first half, while Craig Jenkins led his team to four scoring drives to give Gulf Coast a 20-0 haftime lead.

The 2008 sophomore class finished at Gulf Coast with a 22-2 overall record, a 2007 NJCAA Co-National Title, and two MACJC state championships. Gulf coast also finished the 2008 season with 440 points, which ties the record for most points in college history set by last year's squad.
