Mrs. Helen Davis, wife of campus Executive Dean Curtis Lee Davis, began her life-long association with Mississippi Gulf Coast Junior College as a high school student at Perkinson High School. She graduated from Perkinson Junior College and attended Mississippi State University and the University of Southern Mississippi.

After working for three years as a secretary at Brown-Miller Pickle Company in Wiggins, Mrs. Davis taught at Perkinson Elementary School for six years.

With the opening of Jackson County Campus in 1965, Mrs. Davis played an active role in all school activities including teaching, key punching, working as the school's veterans secretary and administering the GED, ACT and nursing tests. She was instrumental in the formation of the Mississippi Association of Educational Office Personnel on the Jackson County Campus and is a charter member. She has held the office of president as well as other positions in the organization while promoting membership for new secretaries on campus.

Mrs. Davis has five children who all reside in Vancleave and Fort Bayou: Curtis, Jr., James Thomas, Kym, Anne (Mrs. Mike Bass), and John Edwin (Jed). They attend Vancleave Baptist Church and Fort Bayou Baptist Church where Mrs. Davis has taught Sunday School for several years.

Other interests include antiques and working on her family genealogy. She is also a member of the Pascagoula Women's Club and the Fort Bayou Home Extension Club and served as president of the Pascagoula Women's Club for several terms.

She is an avid fan of football, basketball and hunting and has garnered many first prize ribbons at the Jackson County Fair in cooking, gardening, livestock and produce divisions.

In short, a more dedicated and energetic booster of Jackson County and of MGCCJ would be most difficult to find.

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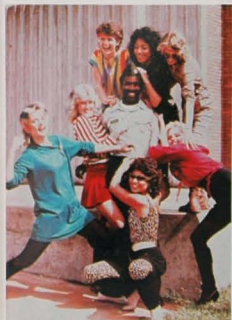
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INNOVATE!

"I think we are really getting involved with school and society. I enjoy getting involved and encouraging others to get involved," stated Lisa Richey.

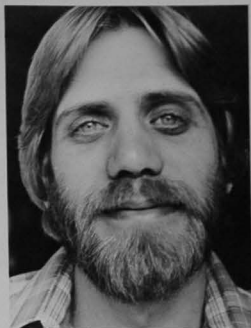

Also mentioned were Gloria Vanderbilt because they are designed to fit women and Liz Claiborne because, as Kris White says, they're longer in length.

According to the poll, most J.C. students wear jeans and nice pants the most, jeans because they are comfortable and easy to care for and dress pants because they look nice and are more businesslike.

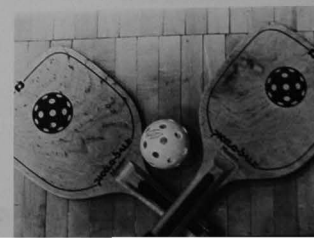

They are James Bryan of Stone County, who succeeded Mrs. Switzer as first vice chair; Robert Slaughter of Jackson County, re-elected second vice chair; Joe D'Angelo of Harrison County, secretary; and Tofe Owen of Harrison County, elected treasurer for another term.

Mrs. Switzer, who was appointed to the board by Harrison County Beat 4 Supervisor Hugh Snowden, also represents

Beat 5. She is the only trustee to represent more than one district.

An outspoken advocate of junior colleges — Gulf Coast in particular — Mrs. Switzer is active in many other organizations. Among them are the United Daughters of the Confederacy and the Mississippi Trustees Association. She was president of both groups.

Alumni honor attorney

Clare Sekul Hornsby, a Biloxi attorney who early in life was taught that only the ministry is a more noble calling than law, was inducted into the Gulf Coast Junior College Alumni Hall of Fame on Oct. 23, 1982.

A 1941 graduate of what is now Perkinston Campus, Mrs. Hornsby became the 13th recipient of the award, presented to her by GCJC President J. J. Hayden Jr. at a homecoming banquet at Perkinston.

In accepting the award, Mrs. Hornsby described a junior college as "... playing the role of a parent. It has a grave responsibility. I am here to say that (Gulf Coast) fulfills that responsibility."

Mrs. Hornsby, the mother of four children, one adopted, believes that parents have an obligation to impart to their offspring "a sense of value, a sense of understanding and self-confidence." "A junior college can pick up where the parents leave off," says the grandmother of four.

As to why she chose to attend "Perk", Mrs. Hornsby explained: "I had never heard of going any other place. Everyone I knew was going there, or had been there. It was a big school to me, a big step (after Biloxi High School)."

Mrs. Hornsby's shingle hadn't been hanging long before she landed one of her first big cases.

Although criminal cases "challenged" her, "I found that adoption cases were a natural thing for me and that is what I specialize in now."

She admitted that she "becomes emotionally involved" with her clients. "I am in my client's shoes. When they cry, I cry. But of course when I get to the courtroom, I realize that what I need to do for them is a lifetime thing. Then I get mean. I want to have my way about it ..."

Active in business and civic affairs, Schloegel was one of the first persons appointed by Gov. William Winter to the Board of Economic Development, which replaced the Agricultural and Industrial Boards as the state's industry-seeking and tourist-promotion agency.

A former national vice president of the United States Jaycees, Schloegel, in 1967, was selected Mississippi's Most Outstanding Jaycee vice president.

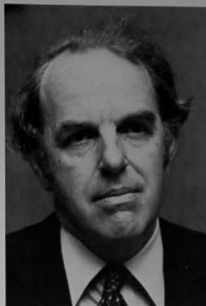
He is listed in Outstanding Young Men of America, Who's Who in Commerce and Industry, Who's Who in the South and Southwest, and Personalities of the South.

Ruins Bulldogs' hope of title bid

The 1982 Bulldog football team, which posted a 10-1-1 record and shared the state championship title with Northwest, "was as good as — maybe better than — the 1971 national championship squad."

So said Coach George Sekul at season's end, an end that came when the Bulldogs and Northwest tied 7-7 for the state title. But it was the regular season 3-2 loss to the Rangers from Senatobia that kept Gulf Coast from a second crack at the national crown. "That one point was our undoing," said Sekul.

Undeclared Northwest, ranked 2nd by the National Junior College Athletic Association, went on to national glory. And 4th-ranked Gulf Coast had to content itself with the thought that it had tied the best team in the country.

En route to doing that the Bulldogs in 10 games rushed for 2,364 yards to the opponents' 694 and passed for 1,059 to 773 for a total of 3,423 to 1,467, a record.

Receiving the coveted Joe Williams "Guts" award was Levell Bradley, a 6-2, 185-pound linebacker from George County.

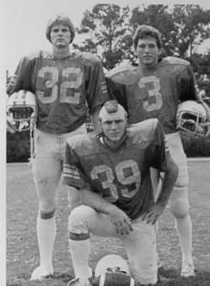
Williams, a decorated Vietnam veteran, played for Gulf Coast in the 1960s. He died with his brother in an automobile accident.

Number '1' haunts No. 1 'dogs

At yearbook deadline time, Coach Bob Weathers' 1983 Bulldog basketball team seemed well on its way to a title-winning season. The squad has lost only two games against 15 victories to rank first in state conference play, first in the National Junior College Athletic Association's Region 20, and 20th in the nation.

But wait: The 1982 team finished its season No. 1, only to lose by one point to Utica in the South Division playoffs. And by one point to Northeast in the championship game. In the NJCAA regional finals, the Bulldogs lost to Paducah, Ky.

You guessed it. By one point.

So Weathers, veteran of 23 years at Gulf Coast, winner of more than 480 games against only about 153 losses, isn't prone to forecast the future.

"It's been a good year so far," is all he would say of the 1983 season.

Players singled out for recognition by Weathers included Calvin Johnson of Gulfport, who early in January led in scoring with a per game average of 13.8, in rebounds with 11.4 and in field goal percentage with 70.

Other high scorers were John McArthur of Moss Point, Richard Johnson of Baton Rouge, and Clarence Gray of Laplace, La.

Leading in assists were Joe Riley of Gulfport, who also had the best free throw percentage. Runner-up to Johnson in rebounds was Dwayne Jones of Houma, La.

The Lady Bulldogs of Coach Doris Smith, led by high-scorer Daisy Casher of Pascagoula, were ranked fourth in South Division basketball play in early February 1983.

Overall the Ladies had a 9-7 record and were 5-5 in the conference as the season wound down to the last couple of games.

Although it appeared unlikely the women could make a serious bid for a title, they found consolation in having improved on the dismal 1981-82 season that saw the team drop 13 games while winning only 8.

Casher, a 5-8 sophomore forward, was credited by Smith with helping sweeten Gulf Coast's basket. In 16 games she had scored 325 points for an average of 20 an outing. She was second in rebounds with 130, behind leader Tammie Dedeaux's 139.

Dedeaux, a 5-11 center from Pass Christian, was second in scoring with 218 points, an average of 14 a game. She and Casher helped boost the team scoring average to 70 a game for a total of 1,124 to the opponents' 1,160.

Another team leader was Robin Fairley, 5-3 guard from Gulfport. She had 105 assists, averaging 7 a game, and 55 steals for a game average of 3.
